PHILADELPHIA SOCIETY FOR PROMOTING AGRICULTURE.—A stated meeting of this Society was held yesterday, Colonel Craig Biddle, President, in the chair. A report from the Agricultural Department, Washington, was received and distributed. Mr. John McGowan exhibited a lot of fine beets, carrots, and parsnips, and also made the following statement in reference to the production of six acres of ground cultivated by him during the present year:—Strawberries, raspberries, etc., sold, \$450; also 300 bushels potatoes, 175 do. carrots, 150 do. beets, 60 do. parsnips, 50 do. corn, 75 do. rutabagas, 50 do. rutabagas, 2000 heads cabbage, with a large variety of garden vegetables, etc., for family use. Mr. McGowan also made the following statement in reference to the planting of early Goodrich potatoes:—I planted in three rows, four feet between rows, and about two and a half feet in the rows, 6 bushels large, which produced 40 bushels; 6 of second size, 53 bushels; 6 do. of third size, 43 bushels; 23 bushels of quite small ones, planted in every other furrow, about a foot apart in the row, produced 34 bushels, a half bushel of large ones, cut to single eyes, produced 12 bushels.

Colonel Biddle presented a communication from Clement Parsons, Esq., in relation to playing cows. He stated that at the time of the operation the cow was giving ten quarts of milk a day. For a few days after it the quantity was very small, but it gradually increased until in Europe, it called in his own words, "rather more than the original measure." The quality was decidedly improved, and the butter made from it of the most beautiful and golden color.

George W. Childs, A. J. Drexel, and C. W. Trotter, Esqs., were nominated as members of the Society. Dr. Thompson moved that a committee of three be appointed to report upon the different varieties and culture of potatoes. The Chair appointed Messrs. Dr. Thompson, John McGowan, and A. W. Harrison. Dr. Kennedy gave an interesting account of the extension of steam agricultural machinery in Europe, and called attention to the necessity of offering premiums for encouraging the introduction of steam machinery in this country.

IMPORTANT DECISION OF THE SUPREME COURT.—A decision was given a few days ago by Judge Strong, of the Supreme Court, now in session in Pittsburgh, which is of general importance. The action was originally brought in the Court of Common Pleas of that city by Mrs. Greiner, plaintiff, to recover the value of some articles which she had left to be dyed at a dyeing establishment. The articles, it appears, had not been called for until after the expiration of one year. The goods could not be found, and the action was brought to recover their value.

The defendant claimed that, at the time the goods were received, he had given the plaintiff a ticket which distinctly stated that no goods would be delivered without the return of the ticket, and that the receiver would be responsible for one year only; that the acceptance of this ticket on the part of the plaintiff made the contract mutual, and therefore she was not entitled to recover. The jury, under instructions of the court, found a verdict for the plaintiff for the amount claimed, and the case was taken up to the Supreme Court on a writ of error. Judge Strong, in his opinion, remarked that in the business in which the defendant was engaged, it was important to him that he should not be burdened with the care of articles for a long time after the work to be done upon them had been completed. He did not receive them for custody, and make a mere clause in the contract that it should be good for one year. During the year, then, the defendant was a bailee for hire.

After the year had expired he was not, and consequently his responsibility was limited to its utmost extent was not beyond that of a depositary. He must have been guilty of gross negligence before he could be held liable for the cost of the goods, which he was no more than an unrevoked depository.
