[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EVENING TELEGRAPH.] WASHINGTON, November 9. Gratifying Reports from Assistant Com-missioners of Freedmen.

The tenor of the reports received by the Freedmen's Bureau from the Assistant Commissioners of the several districts has been, within the past six months, of a nature which inspires the hope that the animosities and prejudices resulting from the war are rapidly fading out, especially in the Southeastern and Border States. A marked diminution in the number of outrages committed upon the freedmen is observable.

A growing disposition is manifested by the civil authorities at most of the centres of population to care for the destitute among the freedmen, and the inclination to administer the laws with impartiality between whites and blacks makes sure but gradual progress. The most prolific cause of complaint at the present time is the great difficulty encountered by the plauters and their hands in agreeing upon a division of the crops.

Disputes of this kind generally terminate in favor of the employer, and where it is apparent that the civil courts will not adjudicate fairly in these cases, agents of the Bureau have been constrained to interfere to secure justice; and that they have done so to the satisfaction of all parties concerned many of the more intelligent and prominent planters have frequently testified in writing to the Assistant Commissioners. THE GREAT WEST.

Lecture of the Hon. Lafayette S. Foster New Haven, Conn., November 9.- The Hon. Lafayette S. Foster, President of the United States Senate, delivered a lecture, last evening, before the members of the Merchants' Exchange, in this city, at their spacious hall. EHis subject was "The Great West and La Resources," in which he gave a description of the Western country he had visited last summer, by appointment of the Government, to inquire into the resources of the Western country and condition of the Indians.

He spoke of the fine scenery and surface of the country passed through, also of the fine mineral springs, and referred to the buffalo hunts, the Indians, and other interesting subjects relating to the Far West. He dwelt at some length upon the necessity of raliroad communication with the Far West, and remarked when the Pacific Raitroad was built it would turn the trade to San Francisco and New York, and these two cities would then become the chief commercial centres in the world. Vice-President Foster spoke for over an hour, and was listened to with marked attention by a large and intellectual audience.
