OUR CITY FINANCERS.—The subject of a statement of the general and additional appropriations to November 1, 1886, and estimated expenditures for the year 1887, was prepared at the office of the City Controller, Joseph R. Lyndall.

The following table shows the general and additional appropriations to November 1, 1886, and estimated expenditures for 1887:

Interest on temporary loans, endorsed warrants, judgments, etc., amounted to \$1,777,471.74. Estimated revenue for 1886, other than taxes, \$1,408,740.

The following shows the liabilities of the city for 1887: Estimated expenses of departments for 1887, \$7,288,708.49; Outstanding warrants November 1, 1886, \$1,288,652.12.

The assets of the city for the year 1887, as given by the Controller, are as follows: Cash on hand November 1, 1886, \$536,440.46.

The following statement was made before the Finance Committee last evening, and the question of fixing the rate of tax for 1887 informally discussed.

Mr. Freeman was in favor of fixing the rate at \$4.75 on the \$100, believing that it was better for the city to pay all the expenses of the departments for the coming year, and the deficiencies of 1886, than to fund a portion, and thereby increase the debt of the city.

Mr. Freeman moved to make the rate \$4.75 per \$100. Messrs. Harper, Marcer, and others desired a postponement of the rate of tax for the purpose of examining the statement, and a motion to that effect prevailed.

FURTHER HEARING IN A SHOOTING CASE.—A further hearing was held yesterday before the Recorder in the case of Edw. Manly, charged with the shooting of Cyrus Parker on Saturday night week, in Shippen street, above Third.

Mr. Manly testified that he was in a public house, when he was told that a man was outside who had struck him a few days previously. He went out, and was attacked, and finally shot in the cheek by one of three or four in company.

CONOR'S CASES.—An inquest was held yesterday on the body of John T. Caskey, who was killed early on Sunday morning by being run over by car No. 7 of the Philadelphia and Frankford Railroad Company.

CONVICTED OF MURDER.—John Hoddap, who murdered a young German named Julius Wechele, last winter, on the farm of Dr. Tiedman, near Gwynedd, Montgomery county,

was brought up for trial on Saturday evening, convicted of murder of the first degree. The circumstances of the murder and the discovery of the murderer, were these:—Julius Wechele, a young man of a good family, met Hoddap in this city last winter, and was persuaded to go to the farm with him.
