Thus far the colonists have not been molested by the natives; but they com-plain of many privations atising from a change-dble elimate, bad water, scarcity of provisions, and want of cash. Not a word is said about the sampassing beauty of the "orange grove," "the early and the latter rain," the "three crops a year," and the "holy, spiritual influence" of the "sacred soul."

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When their village is crected and they are be-ginning to prosper that is, if it be possible to prosper in such a God forsaken land-then their presper in such a God forsaken land—then their real sorrow will berin. At present, while they are poor, and disorganized, the thieves and murderers, who intest the whole region, may set think it worth their while to trouble them; but let them become worth robbing, and they will be robbed without mercy. The colony at present is under the protection of the American Consul, who has obtained a sufficient force from the Turkish Government to keep the thieves at bay. This protection cannot always be afforded, and when it is withdrawn, the colaniets will be compelled to look out for themselves.

There with me Professor Cross, of Germany, one of the most learned and spiritual of men, whose wife is a Russian lady, who has been a resident of this country, principally in Jerusa-lem, for twenty-seven years. He has taught Hebrew in the United States, but has lived here fifteen years. Most of the Americans are en-camped in wooden huts on the sea-shore. Never were seen a more interesting and motley collec-tion of tents. They were extemporaneously built of odd remnants of parti-colored cloths: con-picuonsly prominent were bed-clothes of every hue and fabric, but a dash of rain and a dash of wind prostrated these multiformed houses of the hour, or at least most of them soon faded away. Now they are in better condi-tion, nearly or quite all having wooden de-pendencies to meet the contingencies of the un-certain scason. Scarceiy any rain falls here atter April, but certain ominous, fleecy-hoking barges come drifting slowly over the sea and sprinkled to saturation some things most sensi-tive to humide.

## Senator Wright's Will.

The will of the late Senator William Wright, of New Jersey, was admitted to probate last week in the Surrogate's office of Newark. The entire valuation of the estate was sworn at one million dollars, of which \$600,000 are in real estate and \$400,000 in personal property. All of this is devised to the family except \$1000, which is given to the House of Prayer. The homestead, outbuildings, and adjoining pro-perty on Park Place, running through to River street, is given to the widow for her use during her lifetime, and after her death goes to her children.

The sum of fifteen thousand dollars is given to his grandson, and ten thousand dollars to his grand-daughter, children of Mrs. Gavers, his daughter in Russia, and a like sum respectively to the son and daughter of his only son, Colonel E. H. Wright. The rest of the property is to be equally divided between the widow, son, and daughter—the latter's portion being secured to her for her sole use. Provision is made in case of the death of any one of the legatees for dividing their share among the survivors of the dividing their share among the survivors of the legal representatives. The will is dated Feb-ruary 17, 1866. United States revenue stamps to the value of five hundred dollars were attached to the will when it was admitted to probate.

Rev. Henry A. Neely, recently elected to the Bishopric in the diocese of Maine, made vacant by the death of the lamented Bishop Burgess, was born in 1830, at Fayetteville, Onondaga county, New York, and his father shortly after removed to Chicago, where he remained for fi -10 20 teen or twenty years, a well-known commission merchant, the family residing most of the time at Belvidere. He graduated at Geneva, now Hobart College, in 1849, where, for the next two years ensuing, he studied theology under Bishop De Lancey. He was first rector at Cal-yary Church, Utica, and then of Christ Church, Rechester, building up both parishes, and after wards, at the solicitation of his Bishop, Chaplain of Hobart College, where he was admired for his scholastic ability and zealous discharge of the responsibilities of his position. He is now assistant minister at Trinity Chapel, in New York.

A New Powder — A new explosive mixture called "Poudre Fontaine," used in the torpe toes which were tried against the hull of the Vauban, has been employed in blowing up the old quays of one of the basins at Toulon now in process of extender. A mine charged with five kills extension. A mine charged with five kilo-grammes of the powder exploded with such effect that a charge of one hundred kilogrammes of the ordinary gunpowder would have caused less destruction. The charge was purposely a small one, and the engineers congratulated themselves on having commenced so cautiously A singular result of the explosion was the kill. ing a quantity of fish. The workmen picked up seventy or eighty pounds weight, which floated on the surface of the water. The same phenomenon had been remarked from the action of the torpedoes.

Michael Angelo's "David."-A bronze casting has been made of Michael Angelo's colossat marble statue of David, in front of the Palazzo Vecchio, in Florence, and it is proposed to sub stitute the reproduction for the original, which has stood for more than three centuries and a half exposed to all changes of weather, and which will then be removed to the museum of the "Pretorio." This celebrated statue (of which there is a plaster cast in the South Kensington Museum, presented by the late Grand Duke of Tuscany) is one of the few left complete by Michael Angelo, and a noble work, although he labored under the disad cantage of having to use a block of marble which had already been wrought upon by an inferior artist, and was considered to have been spoiled.

A Curious Case.-- A curious pig case was lately tried at Norwich, England. A woman, being about to purchase a full-grown pig for the moderate sum of sixteen shillings, asked the yendor whether the animal was "all right." "It's a precious sight righter than you," was the "It's a precious sight righter than you," was the reply—an assurance which the purchaser, con-sidering her own soundness unimpeachable, appears to have thought perfectly satisfactory. The pig, however, in a few days, died, and the question then arose, and was tried before the local magistrate, whether a "issurants" had local magistrate, whether a "warranty" had been given with it. The woman laid great stress on the fact that the pig had been de-clared "righter" even than she was; but the magistrates were of opinion that that didn't unt to much, and dismissed the case.

A Unique Carriage.-A colored man drove through the streets of Richmond, last Saturday, in an open one-horse carriage, made wholly of proom straw, with the exception of wheels and running-gear, which attracted almost as much attention as the arrival of a circus or menagerie. attention as the arrival of a circus or menagerie. The wheels were sawed out of solid timber and measured eighteen inches in diameter, and re-volved glibly on their well-lubricated axies. The shafts and harness consisted of light ma-terial, tastefully adjusted; the body being without top or cover, three feet in length and perhaps two feet in width, consisting entirely of straw interwoven with osiers in a very compact and artistic manner, with a seat of the same material in the hinder part, and just large enough to admit a manenough to admit a man.
