The Constitutional Amendment and the
Missouni Redicats,
The telegraph reports on the authority of the 8t. Louis Evening Neiss, that Governor
Fletcher, Hon. B. Gratz Brown, Hon. Henry inaugurated a movement in that city having
for its object the refection by the Legislature
of the Congressional amendment of the State Constitutition, so as to
abrogate the disiranchisement of Rsbels, and We have no idea that the Republicans of
Missourt will adopt any sach course of pro-
ceeding. The Constitutionnl contemplates many mat er of supreme it-
portance, which cannot be subordinated to any question of suffrage whatever. The
extension of the suffrage is important, but
there are Rebellion that cannot be overlooked. We
have no doubt the Republicans of Missourt wave no doubt the repubicans of hissour
wilt take action upon the amendment similhr
to that morally sure to be taken by the other loyal Sutates.
While this
State of Mis limits, the plan of enfranchisement. both as
to the Rebels and to her colored citizens,
rather than that of disiranchitent The Constitution of Mitssoour disfranchises
all Ler colored citizens, and also all Rebels plan works badyy. It is palpably unjust
towards the colored citizens, while theRebels and hebel sympathizers, to a great extent,
commit periurv, and thus nullity the constitu-
tional provision. The enfranchisement of both classes, while it would, probabblys, not matarorially
affect the status of political parties within the State, would contribute to the public peace
and tranquillity. Fitherto the Democratic pathizers would almost to a man act, has
strenuously opposed the enfranchisement of the calored citizens; but as it is now in a
decided minority in the State, it might, perhaps, be ready to purchase a avor hor colored
by doing an act of lustice to the co
people. An amendment to the State Consti-
tution, which should cover bo h classes, so iranchising the colored citizen without at the
same time voting for Rebels and Rebel sympathizers, would proba-
bly be adopted on a popular vote. But the adoption of such a plan by
the Republicans of Missouri does not at all do away with the necessity of the Constitu-
tonal amendment proposed by Congress.
The one has reference to their own local

should be plessed to see the State ol Mis souri adopt the priaciple of enfranchisemen
as opposed to disfranchisement, within her
borders, because we believe she is atrong enough to do to safely; but we should regrot
