An ordinance making an appropriation to erect an iron railing around the new! Court House was calted up, and postponed until the next meeting.

Mr. Marcer, from the Committee on Finance, reported a bill making an appropriation for the support of the public schools for 1867, the conration of which was postponed.

The same gentleman reported a bill making an appropriation to the Department of Highways, Bridges, etc. Postponed. The Committee on Finance reported the opinion of the City Solicitor, adverse to the claum of constables for serving certificates of election.

The committee was discharged from the further consideration of the subject. Mr. Miller, of the Highway Committee, re-ported a resolution authorizing the paying of Broad street, from Jefferson to Oxford streets,

with the Nicnolson patent paving. The resolution was agreed to.

ber of citizens protesting against the erection of a bridge over the Schuylkill at South street. Mr. Miller moved that the ordinance providing for the erection of a bridge at South street, which was made the special order for the present meeting, be postponed for the present.

The supplementary ordinance to reorganize the Fire Department, submitted on Thursday week, was taken up.

Committee on Fire and Trusts. The motion was discussed until the hour of adjournment. FIRE AT THE NEW CHESNUT STREET THE-ATRE - A MAN BABLY BURNED. - About one

o'clock yesterday afternoon considerable excite-ment was created on the crowded streets by the ringing of the fire belts, and the announcement that the New Chesnut Street Theatre was on fire. Hundreds of persons ran in the direction of Twelith and Chesnut streets, and in a few minutes steamers were at work in different streets in the locality of the theatre, forcing water to the scene of the fire.

At one time it was thought the theatre was doomed to destruction. Dense masses of smoke poured out of the doors and windows, and the interior was so tiled with it that it was almost impossible to remain within the walls for any length of time. Hose was carried into the building by the Chesnut street door, but no fire could be seen, and it was soon made known that the flames were confined to the rear part or the theatre, under the stage.

It appeared on inquiry that Mr. James Price, the gas-fitter of the establishment, had gone into the cellar for the purpose of turning on the gas in readiness for the matinee which was to have taker place, and just as he was about returning upstairs the meter exploded with a loud noise, and set fire to the meter-room, besides burning Mr. Price in a very serious and painful manner about the face and hands. Nowithstanding his injuries, Mr. Price, with commendable presence of mind, and his best to extinguish the names, but was forced to beat a hasty retreat.

The fire communicated to the woodwork of the meter-room and the engine-room which adjoins it, and but for the prempt action of the attaches of the establishment and the firemen. a serious conflagration would have ensued. As it was, the flames did not get beyond the locality mentioned. A number of fire compa nies were about pouring streams of water into vented mainly through the exertions of Manu-ger Sinn, who underste d the situation of the

The amount required for these purposes is \$8650, towards which only \$2048 d8 have been subscribed, and the support of the public is cornestly requested for the balance. The daily average of the altendance at the Mission, Nucreenth and Spring Garden streets, has been 115 schulars and 15 officer

The managers of the institution expect to necomplish a great and good work in regene rating and elevating to a great extent the colored youth in our city. 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
