INTERESTING IFEMS.

The Proposed Impeachment-It, has been tated that the Hon, John A. Bingham, of Onto. in several speeches made during the campaign, pledged himself to move the impeachment of the President at the approaching session of Congress. This, says the Cincinnati Gazette, is not correct. What Mr. Bingham did say was, that while the President, in his opinion, deserved impeachment, he would only make the motion for impeachment if Mr Johnson should officially assert weat be had unofficially claimed, that Congress was an illegal body, unlawfully assuming the functions of legislation. General Benjamin F. Butler, however, seems to draw no such dis inction as this, as indicated by his speech in Brocklyn, New York, on Satur-day night. Butler will probably and in the end that he has little influence in the matter. passion of such men will not be supported by more rational mon.

Tennessee .- A bill to define the qualifications of jurois has passed both branches of the Ten-nessee Legislature, taking effect from and after its passage. It provides that in all trials, civil or oriminal, in any courts of Tennessee, it shall be good ground of challenge for cause as to competency of any juror, that such person is not a qualitied voter of this State. The bill also provides that persons guilty of rape, as now defined by Tennessee statutes, shall suffer death by hanging but the jury may commute the punishment to impresentent for not less than ten years or more than twenty years. Fitty-seven radical senators and representatives call a state Republican Union Convention, to meet at Nasoville on the 22d of February next, to nominate a candidate for Governor to represent the Union men of Tennessee.




