REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE MINT. Ex-Governor James Pollock, Director of the United States Mint, has submitted his annual report to Hugh McCulloch, Esq., Secretary of the Treasury. The report states that the depo-sits of bullion and coinage during the late fiscal year, exhibit a satisfactory increase over those

of the previous year.

The amount of bullion, in value, received at the Mint and branches during the fiscal year,

Gold, \$37,223,640.17; silver, \$1,723,516.71; total deposits, \$38,947,156'88. From this total a deduction must be made for the bullion redeposited, or bars made at one branch of the Mint, and deposited at another for coinage. Deducting the redeposits, the amount will be \$31,911,719\*24.

The coinage for the same period was as follows:—Gold coin, \$28,913,944\*90; unparted and time gold bars, \$9,115,486\*49; silver coin, \$680,-264\*50; silver bars, \$916,382\*68; cents coined one

; silver bars, \$916,382.68; cents coined, one, two, three, and five-cent pieces, \$646,570.00; total coinage, \$29,640,779.40; number of pieces of all denominations coined, 38,527,923.

The distribution of the bullion received at the Mint and branches was as follows:-

At the Branch Mint, San Francisco, the gold deposits were \$17,636,332.04; gold coined, \$18,-217,300; silver deposits and purchases, \$710,588-45; silver coined, \$280,950; silver bars, \$442,342\*-64; total coinage of gold and silver, \$18,498,250; number of pieces, 1,929,881. The Assay Office in New York received during

the year, in gold builton, \$9,076,422, and in stiver, \$672,256; number of fine gold bars stamped at that office, 3760—value, \$3,862,451; silver bars, 4397—value, \$450,594; total value of gold and silver bullion, \$9,748,678.

THE MURDER OF CAPTAIN JAMES WILEY. -Alfred Teufel, who was arrested in this city on the charge of murdering Captain James Wiley, of Doylestown, has been fully committed to answer the murder, upon the testimony of a lad, named Harman Rick, employed on the boat of Captain Wiley. The testimony is circumstantial as to the occurrence, but there was an admission to the boy by the prisoner that he killed the Captain. Teufel is of German parent-age, but he was born in Pennsylvania. It was said that during the war he was tried by a courtmartial for desertion from the army, and sen-tenced to be shot. How he escaped is not known. After Teufel's commitment he was hobbled and manacled in his cell, and four times within a lew days succeeded in removing the manacles, and twice relieved himself of the

The following is a description of him:—He is in his twenty-second year, but looks older, doubtless owing to his exposed and reckless manner of life; is far from being ill-favored in features; a stout-built and remarkably stalwart form, quick, resiless, and active in all his movements; a bright, keen, blazk eye, and rather dark complexion, with a countenance by no means repulsive or malignant. Genteel in dress, if it did not verge upon the fast and flash in style, and a manner indicative of row-dyism. He manifests by neither tremor of voice, downcast look, nor change of his color, that he either appreciates or cares for the serious charge now pending against him.

CONVENTION OF FIREMEN.-A meeting of the Firemen's Convention, the object of which is to take action in reference to the bill before Councils, to create a Board of Fire Commissioners, was beld last evening at the Humane Hose house, William D. Kendrick, of the Columbia Engine Company, in the chair. There were forty-eight companies represented.

Mr. Showaker, Chairman of the Committee on Resolutions, reported that the remonstrance of the Convention had been laid before Coun-The Committee had found among the members of Councils considerable opposition to the proposed ordinance, and the Chairman expressed the opinion that it would finally be referred to the Committee on Fire and Trusts, where it would rest. A discussion followed upon a proposition to

appoint a committee to prepare an ordinance, as a substitute for the one before Councils, that would be without its objectionable features. It was opposed because of a want of time to prepare such an ordinance; also, for the reason hat firemen do not desire a change; and any action of the Convention in that direction would look like a submission to Councils.

The proposition was so altered as to embody a request to Councils to provide for a conference between the Committee on Fire and Trusts and the Committee on Resolutions of the Conven-tion, with a view to the preparation of an ordi-nance that will keep the controlling power in the hands of the firemen. MEETING OF THE HORTICULTURAL Society. - The public in general, since the Horticultural Society is about to give it a magnifi-cent hall, second to none in the United States point of beauty and commodiousness, is awakening to a conception of the fact that the institution is an important one. Last evening, at the regular meeting of the Society, an essay was read by Edwin Satterthwaite, of Jenkintown, upon the subject of "Garden Farming." The speaker seemed to think that the day was not distant when lands in the vicinity of our cities, advancing rapidly in value, would be cultivated as carefully as corresponding lands in Europe. Many of the essays read before this Society possess great value, and may yet be collected into a volume or volumes.

It was stated last night that the new Horticultural Hall is advancing handsomely towards completion. The raiters of the roof are now being put up. Persons posted in the matter pronounce the work an extremely fine specimen of roof trussing. The building is 75 by 100 feet in area. Its cost will be \$125,000, of which \$25,000 of stock remains to be taken. The front is of pearl colored Delaware county stone, with embellishments of Connecticut brown stone. If the Hall were finished, it could be let for every night in the season. It will seat 2500 people, and will probably be first occupied by the Phila-delphia Pharmaceutical Society's anniversary.

Fire.-About quarter-past 9 o'clock last evening, a fire broke out in the first story of the shipsmith and machine shop of A. H. Stilwell, located at No. 776 Swanson street. The flames burned stubbornly for nearly half an hour, and before they were extinguished the second-story floor was partially destroyed. The damage by fire and water will probably reach between two and three hundred dollars.

#### CAMDEN AFFAIRS.

THE MAIL CAR ROBBERY .- Samuel P. Fithian had a further bearing before United States Commissioner Budd yesterday morning, upon the charge of robbing the mail car of which had charge on the Delaware and Raritan Railroad. The facts of the case are fully ex-plained in the following evidence:—

Detective Gamble sworn—The package of letters picked up on the route between Jackson and Longcoming were identified by the witness as the one he had seen in the car. The letters were handed to me by Mr. Roker, Assistant Post-master at Jackson; I know Mr. Fithian as a mail agent; he had charge of the mail on the day the robbery was committed: I have been in the Government service since May, 1861, as mall agent and detective; I was appointed by C. A. Walborn, and was sent by Postmaster Hall to ferret out the robbers; there is a loc e system in carrying the mail; the mail car is accessible to all the passengers, there being no locks on the door, to my knowledge; the letters were found on the 25th of November, and they are supposed to have been thrown from the car on the 24th; it would be possible for any one to step in the car and throw the package of letters from it; I don't know the custom of the route

when they carry mails,
Mr. William D. Moore sworn—I am money messenger for the Railroad; I was in the car on the 24th of November; on coming through the cars stopped at the door of the mail car; I saw a package of letters lying on the floor; Mr. Quigley threw the bundle on the desk; I saw Mr. Fithian sitting beside the door asleep; there was a passage from the mail car to the smokingroom; the habit of carrying the mails has been very loose; the mail bag which Mr. Fithian had for the letters was tied with a string; it is the custom for all the agents to go to sleep on the way between Jackson and Camden: the smoking car is attached to the baggage car, and any person could go in and out.

Mr. Quigley sworn—I am conductor of the train of which Mr. Fitbian is the mail agent; I have been engaged only a few months on this line; I was on the train on the 24th of November: Fithian has been on the train since I took charge; I knew nothing of the robbery until informed of it; I never saw anything unusual about Mr. Fithian; I saw Mr. Fithian sitting in the smoking car; I took up a small package of letters and threw them on the desk. The evidence here closed. The defendant was beld in \$1000 ball to answer before the District

Court at Trenton, on the 3d Tuesday in January. MALICIOUS MISCHIEF .- John Lambs and John Kelley had a hearing before Mayor Budd yesterday morning, upon the charge of mali-cious mischief. It appears from the evidence of the officers who arrested them that they were engaged in breaking windows, and in addition to that made an assault upon Barney Meeney, who remonstrated with them, and told them
