THE LATE ACCIDENT-CORONER'S IN-QUEST.—Yesterday afternoon an inquest was held at Coroner Daniels' office upon the body of John Logue, who was killed by a wall falling upon him at the northwest corner of Twelfth and Market streets, on Thursday morning. The

following testimony was heard:—
Robert Weeter, living at No. 1207 Carlton street, testified that he kept a coffee-stand at the corner, on the Twelfth street side of the building; had examined the building a short time before the wall fell; considered it sate; about 11 o'clock in the morning, while conversing with Mr. Keenan, the wall tell; Mr. Logue was in the street at the time loading a wagon; understood

that Mr. Liggett had notified the building in spectors to view the property.

Matthew Robertson festified that he was in the cellar at the time the wall fell; did not consider the wall safe. Robert Liggett testified that he owned the building the morning of the fire he went to the

building inspectors; saw the clerk; was told by him to get a permit; the Fire Association sent up some men to look at the building; witness told them that he thought it dangerous; they replied that they considered it safe.

The jury returned the following verdict:-That the said John Logue came to his death by injuries received from the falling of a wall at the building N. W. corner of Twelith and Market
