He can see no way to the success of the republic but that which leads over the political dead body of President Johnson.

The Condition of the Country—Order Against Anarchy. In all great revolutions, rapidly developed, next to the dangers of a direct defeat are the dangers of success.

There may be nothing, as yet, to justify immediate apprehension. Certainly there is nothing to warrant any such alarm. But throughout the North, as at New Orleans, causes of uneasiness are in operation, and these should induce the exercise of the utmost caution in every branch of trade and industry.

The diffusion of these causes of uneasiness over the entire country should prevent any attempt to obtain relief by tariff legislation. If a particular industry suffered while all around enjoyed a full measure of prosperity, an appeal for an exceptional increase of duty might not be unnecessary.

Not that any patent is available by which the country may be saved from the penalties of over-production and over-trading. No action of legislative character is available, and the consequence of departures from the sound level of finance and trade, but something may be done towards lightening the burdens under which the community suffers.
