The list of Senators, members of the late Rebel Congress, officers of the United States army and navy who joined the Rebellion, Senators and members of the United States Congress who left their seats for the same purpose, and Rebel Generals who have been pardoned by the President, has been completed, and will be sent to the House of Representatives, in compliance with a resolution. The list contains 296 names, as follows:--

Alabams, 33; Arkansas, 29; District of Columbia, 25; Florida, 8; Georgia 15; Kentucky, 12; Louisiana, 21; Maryland, 3; Mississippi, 16; Missis souri, 8; North Carolina, 11; South Carolina, 21; Tennessee, 15; Texas, 13; Virginia, 48; and West riginia, 9.
This list does not contain the names of a targe

number who were pardoned under the twenty. thousand dollar clause-the recommendations under which they were pardoned accompanying the list.
