When we consider the fact that our city was visited during the past summer with the cholers, and that about 000 persons died from the disease, we have great cause for congratulation. The table of 1865 is made up to the close of the year, while the one of 1865 closes on Satursay, leaving the mortality of three days to be added. If we estimate the deaths for that time at 180, we still find the mortality of 1866 to be 285 less than in 1855, when the deaths were but one in every 47 of the population.

There were in the hands of the commission houses, sorwarders, and miliers, on Saturday, 95,500 bairels of flour; 186 500 bushels of wheat; 2538 barrels com meal; and 1775 barrels rye flour. The average monthly price of flour during the year was as follows:—January \$7.25; February, \$6.50; March, \$6.75; April, \$7.25; May \$8.5; June, \$6.50; July, \$7; Aurust, \$8.25; September, \$8.40; October, \$9; November, \$8.50; December, \$8.75.

BUILDING IMPROVEMENTS OF THE YEAR.— From the 1st of January to the close of December, 1866, there were taken out of the office of the Building Inspectors permits as follows:— In January, 41 for new buildings and 25 for altera-tions and repairs; number of dwellings 30, facto-tories 2.

In February, 62 for new buildings 60 for alterations and additions, for dwellings 27, for ractories 4.

During March 267 were taken out for new buildings, 119 for alterations and additions—total, 386. For dwellings 207, for ractories 7, 1 for a foundry, 16 for stores, and 1 for school bouse.

In April there were issued 255 permits for new buildings, 189 of which were for dwellings; and in addition there were 128 permits for alterations, 2 for school-houses, 7 for stores, 2 for actories, 1 for a sugar house, and 1 for a church.

During May there were issued 184 permits for new buildings, of which 96 were for dwe lings. There were besides 112 permits for alterations and additions 3 for churches, 6 for factories, 1 for a school-house, and 1 for a printing office (the Ledger building, Sixib and Chemut streets.)

In June there were 399 permits issued for new buildings, 399 being for dwellings, and 123 for a terations and addition, 6 for factories, 1 for a foundry, 1 for a school-house.

July was a heavy morth for building operations. The permits were 337 for new houses, 254 of which were dwellings, 136 for alterations and additions, 8 for factories, 13 for stores 3 for churches.

The august the permits for new buildings numbered 337; for alterations and additions, 19 for new buildings have been 112; school houses 2; churches, 1; foundries 1; store houses.

In October the permits aumbered 416; 365 for new

Soundries 1; store houses 3. In October the permits numbered 416; 205 for new structures, and 109 for alterations and additions; the dwellings numbered 211; factories, 9; 1 for a mul;

structures and 105 for alterations and additions; the dwellings numbered 21; factories, 9; 1 for a miri; achool buses, 4.

There was in Rovember a total of 21; permits, 228 being for new buildings 34 for alterations and repairs, 2 for school houses, 5 for store houses, 1 for a church. The permits in December numbered, for new brildings, 45; for alterations and additions, 35. There were bridges, 12 for other structures, such as botter houses, shops offices, breweries, etc.

The permits issued for new buildings figure up to a total of 275s, and those for alterations and repairs to 1151, but it is to be remembered that as one permit is often taken out for several buildings, the number given is not the total of new structures erocied. The astimate is 64.40.

FINANCE AND COMMERCE.

OFFICE OF THE EVENING TELEGRAPH, Tuesday, January 1, 1867.
