C., reports that the civil authorities there practise whipping of negroes ostensibly as punishment for petty crimes, but, in fact, for the purpose of disqualifying them from using the elective franchise under the laws of North Carolina, should that right be granted them by the law of the land. Over sixty negroes have been whipped in one county during the recent session of the Court.
