ACADEMY OF NATURAL SCIENCES .- The subscription to the building fund of the Aca-demy having exce eded \$100,000, the subscribers on the 8th of January elected Messrs. Edward S. Whelen, Frederick Graeff, Joseph Leidy, Wil-liam P. Wilstach, W. S. W. Ruschenberger, John B. Bodd, William S. Vaux, John Welsh, George W. Tryon, Jr., Thomas Sparks, Robert Bridges, Joseph Jeanes, and John Rice to be a Board of Trustees of the Building Fund till the next annual election, which is to occur on the second Tuesday in January, 1868. On the 11th inst., this Board convened. W. S. W. Ruschenberger was chosen Chairman; George W. Tryon, Jr., Secretary; and William S. Vaux, Treasurer; and in conjunction with him, Messre, Wilstach, Budd, Sparks, and Whelen were appointed the Committee of Finance.

Death of a Descendant of Columbus.

The Madrid papers announce the death of the Duke of Neragua, a grandee of Spain of the first class. The Paris papers, in reproducing the news, describe him as "Admiral and Governor-General of the Indues." The deceased Duke was neither an Admiral nor a Governor of the Indues or of any other place. These were merely titles which he inherited from his ancestor, Christopher Columbus, or Cristoval Colon, as he is called in Spain. It is known that Columbus eft two sons, Ferdinand and Diego; the former llegitimate, who inherited much of his father's genus, of whom he left a valuable memoir, The neglect and ingratitude with which the after the death of Isabella, is a matter of history. His legitimate son, Diego, after a long and tedious lawsuit against the Crown, obtained a decision from the Council of the Indies that he was entitled to the privileges and titles conferred upon his father.

But the cares and anxietles he has undergone in the pursuit of his just chains had done their work upon his frame, and there is no doubt that trouble, grief, and disappointment hastened his premature death. "He was worn out," Herrata says, "by following up his claims and defending himself from the calumnies of his competitors, who, with many stratagems and devices, sought to darken the glory of the father and the virtue of the son." Diego latt two-sons and three daughters. His widow continned the struggle in defense of the rights of her eldest son, Luis, then only six years of age. She left St. Domingo, where she was on the death of her husband, and arrived in Spain. The title of Admiral of the Indies was distely conferred upon him by Charles V, who augmented his revenue, but set up opposition to his claim to the Viceroyalty of the province of Veragua, conferred upon his grandfather, which was thought too vast for a subject to enforce, and moreover, involved an intermina-

ble litigation The claims were at last commuted for the titles of Duke of Veragua, Admiral of the Indies, and Marquis of Jamaica. Don Luis left no issue, and was succeeded by his nephew Diego, son of his brother Christopher. Diego married his cousin Philippa: but he also died without issue, and with him the legitimate male line of Columbus became extinct. A long law-suit ensued among the surviving members of the family, of whom Balthaser Colombo, of the house of Cuccaro in Montferrat (Pledmont), was the most active and persevering, and who maintained that it was he who had the right to inherit the estates and dignities descended from the great Admiral. The cause lasted for thirty years, and was finally decided by the Council of the Indies in 1608, who formally declared the of the Indies in 160%, who formally declared the male line extinct. Nuno Gelves de Portugallo, grandson of Isabella, third daughter of Diego, son of Columbus, was put in posses-sion of the titles and estates, and became Duke of Veragua, Isabella having mar-ried George of Portugal, Count of Gelves; and thus those titles and estates passed into a branch of the house of Braganza esta-blished in Sosin. It is from this branch the blished in Spain. It is from this branch that the Duke whose death is just announced was descended. His titles were Don Pedro de Portu-Jamaica, y Almirante de las Indias. The late Duke never igured in public life. It was his pasture grounds that used to turn out some of the best bulls for the Madrid arena. The by him, and Washington Irving gratefully ac-knowledges the liberality of the descendant and representative of the great discoverer in submit-ting them to his inspection, and exhibiting the treasures they contained when he was collecting materials for his history of the life and voyages of Christopher Columbus. Diego, the son of Columbus, married a niece of the celebrated Duke of Alva of the great Toledo family, and such an alliance shows the place which the father attained in Spain in his lifetime.
