## CURIOSITIES OF LONDON.

The Public Houses-Signs-Trades, Etc. In a notice of the new "London Directory," the London Times gives the following curious gleanings from that volume:--

### THE LIQUOR TRAFFIC.

If anybody is curious to know the relative impertance of each trade in London, indged by the numbers of those who follow it, you can get this information without much difficulty from the trades directory. The publicans appear to be far and away the most numerous. This volume contains the names of about 4700, not including 300 hotels, taverns, or coffee-houses of a superior class, which are ranged by themselves, and 100 private hetels not licensed. Of peer retailers there are not less than 1700; of wine merchants an equal number. Even this estimate by no means exhausts the list of those whose business means exhausts the flat of those whose business it is to supply London with stimulants more or less gentle. Some 150 brewers are in the list; and then the brewers' agents, the distillers, and spirit merchants, the dealers in liquors, cider, and perry have still to be reckoned. It is pro-bably below the mark to say that 10,000 persons in this "Directory" are shown to be engaged, either wholly or partially in what tectotallers either wholly or partially, in what tectotallers call the "liquor traffic." Of course, this does not include a whole army of brewers' men, draymen, waiters, barmen and barmaids, tap-sters, cellarmen, pot-boys, and hanger-on of all sorts, whose interests are also bound up in this traffic. We don't venture to estimate their numbers, but the Alliance may do so and weapble.

### VARIOUS TRADES.

After the publicans, the bootmakers take rank. Of these there are over 3000-ail, we rank. Of these there are over 3000-ail, we presume, keeping something like a shop-and 200 wholesale makers. The grocers and tea dealers are less numerous by a hundred or so. Next comes the tailors-2600; the bakers, 1850; the butchers, 1750; the tobacconists, 1500; and the milliners, 1460, as numerous a body as the greengrocers. The lodging house keepers own to a strength of 1350, but must really be a much more imposing body. With these the dairymen and the builders take the same rank. The linen drapers only muster some 1100; but then the drapers only muster some 1100; but then the haberdashers, 400; the hosiers, 500; and the outfitters, 250 strong, march in separate companies. Of private schools there are nearly 1200.

### PUBLIC-HOUSE SIGNS.

The public-house signs, all of which are duly set forth in the "Directory," have often tur-nished a chapter to the antiquary. They are of interest, too, in showing the vast limits of a metropolis which can permit the repetition of so many of the popular signs without practical confusion. As one might expect, the chief run is upon such emblems as loyal men would natu-rally select. The King's Arms heads the list. Taily select. The King's Arms heads the list; there are 87 such signs in London. The Queen's Arms only number 23. Delicacy seems to have suggested to mine host the choice of her Majes-ty's head, and accordingly there are 49 Queen's and 60 King's Reads. The Royal Oak stands for 26 signs; the Royal Standard for 12. The Crown gives a name to 73 houses let stance to Chem gives a name to 73 houses, let alone 18 Crown and Auchors, 6 Crown and Cushions, 10 Crown and Sceptres, 46 Rose and Crowns, and 17 houses where this emblem of royalty is found in more questionable society, such as the Crown and Anvil, the Crown and Apple Tree, the Crown and Barley Mow, and the Crown Tree, the Crown and Barley Mow, and the Crown and Can. To Prince Albert 23 public houses are dedicated; to the Prince of Wales, 49; to the Princess of Wales, 8; to the Princess Royal, 8; to Prince Alfred, 10; to Prince Arthur, 3; the Princess Allce, 2; and the Princess Beatrice, 1. ### THE NUMBER THREE.

Flint Instruments. Two papers have been addressed to the Paris Academy of Sciences on fossil remains and fint instruments. The first is from M. Husson, who says that new excavations made at the first entrance to the Labyrinth (Trous de Sainte-Reine) have convinced him of the post-Alpine nature of the superficial clay

contained therein. The real Alpine drift only begins at a depth of two met. fifty cent., while the superficial stra-tum, containing feasil bones of the bear, cer-tainly was disturbed by man at a comparatively recent period, since ashes and organic remains of moss and leaves are met with there; here also were found the impression of a human face, and an amulet made of the antiers of either the stag or reindeer. He considers it certain that the bear and byena survived the period of the Alpine drift, since the bones of these animals exist in the undisturbed strata. Nevertheless, there are in these caverns a few passages en-tirely filled with what M. Elie de Beaumont calle tirely filled with what M. The second paper was sent in by M. Simonin, on certain flint instruments found in Central America, and especially in the vicinity of Panama. In 1859 a number of Indian tombs were discovered in the environs of the gold placer of Chiriqui. Some of the Indians buried there had been gold-seekers, and their imple-ments, and even some large nuggets, were put into the tomb with them. The implement into the tomb with them. The implements were:-First, a chisel to cut the metal with: second, a punch; and third, several buraishers. The chisel was triangular, 3<sup>4</sup> centimetres broad, and 10<sup>4</sup> in length. The punch was 7<sup>4</sup> centi-metres in length, 1<sup>4</sup> in breadth, and still bore traces of gold upon its surface. ## Tuning-Forks.

M. Niandet-Breguet has described an apparatus of his for prolonging the vibrations of the tuning-fork by means of clock-work; M. Duhamel, and other philosophers after him, having used the tuning-fork as a means of measuring small intervals of time. The new contrivance consists of an apparatus producing isochronous oscillations, and a combination of wheels acting upon the other part by means of an escapement. The tuning-fork regulates the motion of the wheels, which in their turn give the tuning-tork a slight shock, necessary to prolong its oscillations. The inventor thinks that his con-trivance will be found useful in chronoscopic experiments.

### Shooting Stars.

At a recent meeting of the Paris Academy of Sciences, a paper was received from M. Edm. Guilleman, who, on the 13th of November last observed the phenomenon of shooting stars off the Island of Florez, the northernmost of the Azores. The horizon was covered with a narrow band of clouds up to about 10 degrees. From behind this band a series of fiery trains were seen issuing, apparently from the same point, and bearing some resemblance to those of a rocket. Most of these trains passed through the zenith, presenting the most ad-mirable spectacle. The average time employed in crossing over from one horizon to the other was about six seconds. Wasps.


