

OUR HARRISBURG LETTER.

Important to Stockholders of Railroads - The Thirtieth District Contested Election Case - A Committee After the Atlantic and Great Western Railroad Company - Midwinter or Surgery - Change of Time of Opening Elections in Philadelphia - A Sensation - Resolution, Etc. Etc.

HARRISBURG [SPECIAL CORRESPONDENCE EVENING TELEGRAPH] The Senate, yesterday afternoon, after a spirited and animated debate, passed the Cowan-Johnson resolutions.

In the House, this afternoon we have the Constitutional amendments under consideration. As they have already been so thoroughly discussed, it is probable that they will be disposed of before the adjournment this week.

Mr. Deise, of Clinton, is after some officers of railroad companies, who are engaged in transportation on their own account. It is surmised that he is aiming a blow at Colonel Scott and some other officers, under the plea of protecting the stockholders of railroad companies.

The contested election case of Mr. Michael Mullin, from the Thirtieth District of Philadelphia, is still before the committee. You are aware that Mr. Mullin is not an American-born citizen, and that his father was never naturalized. A large number of witnesses have been summoned here from Philadelphia.

Mr. Josephus this morning introduced a bill to incorporate the Mission House, Protestant Episcopal Church of Philadelphia. Mr. Hood, one to increase the rate of interest from six to seven percent.

Mr. Sharples, at the election polls in Philadelphia shall be opened at 8 o'clock in the morning. Mr. Freeman, one to allow colored persons to ride in railroad cars, omnibuses, carriages, &c.

There was a lively scene created in the House this morning by the introduction of the resolution by Dr. Markley, of Montgomery, applauding President Johnson for his recent political course.
