#### ANOTHER TRAGEDY.

A Man Shot Dead in His Own House, In the early part of the afternoon, a man who had some cause of difference with another by the name of Johnson, living in the lower part of the city, in what is called the Neck, went into his house with a double-barrelled shot-gun for the purpose of shooting him.

The people of the middle and western counties are largely in favor of a Free Railroad law, and they will carefully watch the movements of their Senators and Representatives until the bill is disposed of. AN INCIDENT. This afternoon, Governor Geary sent to the This afternoon, Governor Geary sent to the House a telegraphic despatch which he had received from Washington, announcing a favorable turn in affairs at the national capital. The Republicans applauded in the most enthusiastic manner—the Democrats remaining silent. At the same moment, a little terrier dog on the floor set up a most ferocious barking, causing a wild burst of merriment.

The bill to allow the people of Philadelphia to vote for or against the passenger railway cars running on Sanday came up in the House this morning. A stormy discussion ensued. All kinds of amendments were offered; the previous question was thrice called, but not sustained, and the attempt to make it a general bill failed. The hour of adjournment put an end to an interesting scene, and without a vote the House adjourned. Some of the country members, imagining that there was a "nigger in the wood-pile," changed their votes to-day, but there is a clear majority in favor of the bill.
