ANNIVERSARY OF THE LINCOLN INSTITUTION .-A short time since this Institution celebrated its hirst anniversary. It was opened for inmates April 17, 1866. Two boys were placed in the Home on the day of its dedication, and from that time the number has increased to 75 boys—all but two, orphans of soldiers. Nearly all the children are under twelve years of age, and regularly in attendance at school. Six or eight are over that age, and have positions in stores and offices. The provision made for each child by the State is \$110 per aunum.
