Evans, ex-United States Senator. It is but a just tribute to a most excellent lacy:

The death of Mrs. Julia C. Wingate, reliet of the late Joshua Wingate, Jr., at the age of eighty-five years and feur months, was announced in the morning papers of this city yesterday. It is not fitting that one so long a resident among us, and so honored and esteemed wherever known, should pass away without some tribute, however feeble and imperfect, to her virtues and her memory.

At the time of her decease, Mrs. Wingate was the only survivor of the children of the late General Henry Dearborn, of Revolutionary renown, whose services to the cause of our country date from the battle of Bunker Hill. She was born a short time before the close of that great struggle which secured our independence,

great struggle which secured our independence, while her father was absent with the army, following, as he did from the very beginning, in many a field of battle, the new-born flag of his father country. future country.

At the close of that long contest General

At the close of that long contest General Dearborn removed from his then residence in New Hampshire to Gardiner, then Pittston, in this State, where he resided, carrying on extensive business, and filling many high offices of trust and honor, till the accession of Mr. Jefferson to the Presidency of the United States in 1801, when he was called to Washington to be Secretary of War in the Cabinet of that distinguished statesman. This place he filled with great ability during both periods of Mr. Jefferson's Presidency, until the spring of 1809; and during all this time his daughter, then married, with her husband, was an inmatte of his family.

then married, with her husband, was an inmate of his family.

Soon after, her husband was appointed by
President Madison Collector of the port of
Bath, in this State, to which place he moved,
and where he resided till about the year 1822,
when he took up his abode in Portland. Here
he remained until his death in 1848, honored
and esteemed by all, and here his widow has
passed the ramaining years of her life—the leads passed the remaining years of her life—the long quarter of a century which has separated her The Consul-General of Belgium.

Mr. Henry W. T. Mali, Consul-General of Belgium at this port, died at his residence in Fordham, Westchester county, on Sunday evening. Mr. Mali was born at Verviers, Belgium, in 1804, and came to this country at the age of twenty-two, engaging in mercantile pursuits in the city of New York, and building up in time a very extensive business. He was Consul and Consul-General for over thirty-five successive years, his appointment having been the first made foe the United States after the organization of the Kingdom of Belgium. Thoroughly identified, through marriage business connections and long resisters. glum. Thereoughly identified, through marriage, business connections, and long residence, with the interests of his adopted country. Mr. Mail was a sisrling Republican in politics, and his loyalty to the Federal Government during the war and sympathy with free institutions assumed all the intensity of a religious fatth. He was a gentleman of liberal education, with a strong inclination to scientific studies, and a wide range of general information. Universally esteemed for his genial and hospitable disposition, engaging frankness of manner, generosity, and sterling qualities of mind and heart, he will be keenly missed in the extensive circle of which he was so long an ornament. His health has been falling gradually for two years, and last summer he made a voyage to Europe, but did not obtain from the trip the benefit which he expected. The funeral will take place on Wednesday, at 3:30 P. M., from St. James' Episcopal Church, Fordham, and the remains will be deposited in the family vanit at St. Michael's Church, B'loomingdale,—






