AUTUMN, BY TEAM O'RAN .- This is some pumpkins, and the pickles are so thick that they fairly cucumber the ground Such a profuseness is the fruit of much labor.

It stares at us from all the shop windows; it is among all the prizes of the Gift Concerts; and what was only a pleasant dream of good old Bunyan's has become an awful night-mare to us. ON THE MERSEY, BY JAY HAMMIL TON .-Mersey on us, one mee left of the same sort! This is one of Jay's dead calm slyles, and we think it is as good as any of that style. We miss the setting sun in vermillion, though, very much.

PROSPERO AND MIRANDA, BY G. W. PUTTY. This picture portrays a little conceit of Shakespeare's idea of a Robinson Crusoe on a tragic scale; also, a little conceit of Putty's on a piece of canvas. Both conceits are well put-by the Hanging Committee.

ON THE SOURO, BY T. J. FENNPUDS. This little gem displays a perfect fete in the handling. The artist has certainly great feeling for natural scenery, and the view we consider in his happiest vein,

This view of Ben is taken from Glenpiman, yet at that height the pipe is plainly visible. JERSEY SANDS, BY NEDMO RANNE.-This is a very good painting of the sands of life that had run out of the celebrated retired physician, and as such has a historic interest. It was suggested, at the time, by many who read the retired physician's advertisement, that if he had mixed his sands with a little molasses they would not have run out so fast. The artist has caught the inspiration of the scene, and has given us the sands mixed in that manner.

Very prettily painted, but the off wheel seems to be defective in drawing. Indeed, it seems that if any attempt was made at drawing it, it would tumble over. With this trifling exception, we believe it fully up to this artist's usual productions, which always remind us of great cry and little wool.

LEHIGH GAP, BY F. D. BURE GRITCHARDS. It would make anybody gap to sit long in front of this picture. The sleepy atmosphere, the night-marish chirro-scuro, and the dreamy asphaltum effects render this gap worthy the artist.
