One Hundred Thousand Disabled Young Men in France.

The Paris correspondent of the London Times sites official statistics which bear out the assernon that the number of men whom Napoleon proposes to take annually for the army amounts to almost the entire product of able-bodied youth which France can product of able-bodied youth which France can produce. It will astonish many to learn what a large proportion of young men who are forced to draw lots every year and hable to serve as recruits in the order of their numbers are rejected by the medical inspectors. In 1864 the number of men liable to serve was 325,000. Of these were rejected:—18,106 below the standard height; 30,524 weak constitution, consumption, etc.: 15,388 matter. constitution, consumption, etc.; 15,988 muti-lated from birth, hernia, etc.; 9100 humpbacked and flatfooted; 6988 blind or deaf; 963 stam-merers; 4108 insufficient teeth; 5114 syphilis and cognate diseases: 5213 goitre and scrofula: 2158 cretins, lunatics, and paralytics; \$236 divers meapacities. The total youth of the year unit to serve in the army was 109,000 odd.

An Earthquake in the Ionian Isles.

Advices from Corfu report that an earthquake has devastated the islands of Ithaca and Cephalonia. The towns of Agostoli and Lixuri in the latter island are in ruins. Many villages have been totally destroyed. The number of killed and wounded has not yet been ascertained. The inhabitants are now living in wooden barracks hastily constructed from the ruins of their houses. The ships in the offing have taken on board as many as they could. Great suffering exists in all the devastated districts. The first shock was felt on the 3d of last month, about 6 o'clock in the morning. It was felt simulta-neously in Pairas, Ithaca, Cephalonia, Paxo, Coriu. and several other places. Oscillation occurred at Cephalonia on the 6th, of sufficient force to overthrow the few houses yet standing.
