INSPECTION OF STEAM BOLLERS,-Last evening the Franklin Institute again met to consider the proposed ordinances before Councils in reference to inspecting steam boilers.

Coleman Sellers, Esq., presided, in the absence of J. V. Merrick, Esq., who was unable to be present in consequence of a previous engagement. The Secretary, Professor Morton, read the minutes of the last stated meeting, which were approved.

Colonel Page, who was present, asked the privilege of making a few remarks. He stated that, in addition to the two ordinances which the meeting was about to consider, there were others, having reference to the subject, in the hands of Mr. Evans, Chairman of the Sub-Committee on Law of Councils. Mr. Briggs also had one, and it would be impossible for the Institute to properly compare the ordi-nances in general meeting.

The better plan would be to refer the whole

subject to a committee of the Institute. All ordinances in reference to the subject could be referred to them. The committee could then prepare an ordinance, a proper one, too, and submit the same to a general meeting for action. If approved or amended, it would then go to Councils and be acted upon.

Mr. William B. Le Van moved that the whole matter be referred to a special committee of the Institute. Agreed to. Mr. Williams made a motion that the Com-

mittee consist of seven gentlemen. This was also agreed to. Mr. Hart made a motion that the Sub-Committee on Law of Councils be invited to attend

all meetings of the Special Committee. Mr. Briggs moved that J. V. Merrick, Esq., be appointed Chairman of the Committee.

Agreed to.

On motion, the Special Committee was increased to nine, and the following named gentlemen were appointed the Committee, with Mr. Merrick as Chairman: — Robert Briggs, Esq., James Moore, Esq., William Sellers, Esq., Coleman Sellers, Esq., William B. Le Van, Esq., Thomas Shaw, Esq., Samuel Hart, Esq., —— Greenfield, Esq. On motion, adjourned.

INTERESTING REPORT OF PRISON INSPECTORS .-The Board of Prison Inspectors present many inter-esting facts for the consideration of the public and the Lightature. We select at random the following

esting facts for the consideration of the public and the Legislature. We select at random the following extracts:—

During the past year, the Board has to regret the loss of two old and valued members. Matthias W. Baldwin, Esq., who had served for a period of more than ten years as an inspector, died 7th September, 1866. Mr. Baldwin was appointed to this office by the Court of Common Pleas. In 1856, upon the reorganization of the Board in that year, when the appointing power was conferred upon the Courts. Mr. Baldwin's high character and distinguished position in the community could not but give weight and consideration to any body with which his name was connected.

The Board has also to express the most sincere sorrow at the resignation of another old and most useful collengue. Dr. William Shippen. Dr. Shippen entered the Beard at the same date as Mr. Baldwin, having received his appointment also from the Court of Common Pleas in 1856. Br. Shippen has been known through a long life, as one of the most prominent philanthronists of Philadelphita.

The Board has had much pleasure in receiving as a collengue James A. Freeman, Esq., to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Mr. Baldwin, Mr. Freeman's long experience in public affairs will no doubt make him a very useful member of this body. The vacancy, from the resignation of Dr. Shippen, is not yet supplied.

In alinding to the great increase in the number of commitments, the Board says:—It is evident that the capacity of the Prison is now, and with succeeding years will become still more inadequate to the demands of the city. The separate system has been necessarily abandoned, in all the departments of the Prison; and even in the convict corridors, two, three, and in some case, four prisoners are placed together in a single cell. A House of Correction for vagrants is now a serious desideratum—It on no other grounds, at least from the absolute want of capacity in the Prison to afford proper accommodation to the three-fold union of vagrants, untried prisoner

Proposed New Bridge Over the Schuylkill. →A meeting of the Committee on Finance was held last evening, and after the transaction of the regular routine business, the question of reporting a resolution to Councils asking the Legislature to pass the act providing for the erection of a bridge over the Schuylkill, to commence at the foot of Callowhill street on the east and Powelton avenue on the west, was taken up.

Mr. Spencer Miller appeared before the Committee, and urged the necessity of having a bridge at the point named, and the importance of Councils requesting the Legislature to pass the bill which has been laid before them. After a discussion, in which the members

of the Finance Committee participated, the subject was postponed.

The Committee agreed to instruct the Committee on Law of Councils, about to visit Harrisburg, to have that portion of the Consolida-tion act, which limits the power of the city to borrow \$500,000 on temporary loan, changed so \$1,200,000 may be raised at one time for temporary use.

ANNIVERSARY OF A MISSIONARY SOCIETY .-The second anniversary of the Juvenile Missionary Society of the Sunday Schools attached to the Spring Garden Street Methodist Episcopal Church, corner of Twentieth and Spring Garden streets, was held last evening. The attendance was large, every seat in the structure being occupied. The exercises were of an interesting character, consisting of singing, addresses, etc.

The Secretary reported that the total amount of offerings received during the past year amounted to about \$1000, the average monthly offering of each class being 866, against 845 during the previous year. The society is composed of twenty-one male and twenty-two female classes. They hold meetings every month, on Sabbath afternoons.

COMMENCEMENT OF THE UNIVERSITY.-The commencement of the University of Pennsylvania will take place at the Academy of Music, on Thursday next. The number of graduates of this time-honored institution exceeds that of any other medical college in Philadelphia.

ADMITTED TO HOSPITAL .- A lad named Jacob Bicklow was admitted into the Pennsylvania Hospital yesterday, with his hand badly cut in consequence of its being caught in machinery at a bakery at No. 725 N. Third street.

SLIGHT FIRE.-The alarm of fire about halfpast 6 o'clock last evening was caused by the partial burning of the roof of house No. 504 N. Twelfth street.

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

CITY ORDINANCES.

A N ORDINANCE To Promote Public Cleanliness and Health,
Section 1. The Select and Common Councils of
the City of Philadelphia do ordain, That from
and alter May 1, 1867, any person who shall be
the owner or lessee of premises, desirons to connect with any of the sewers in the street, shall
make application at the Department of Surveys, upon a book prepared for that purpose,
and shall pay for said privilege of connection
the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents for all
premises not exceeding sixteen feet in width,
and all over that width the sum of ten dollars,
except they shall have paid proportionally for

except they shall have paid proportionally for the construction of said sewer, in which case the sum of three dollars shall be paid.

Section 2. That it shall be the duty of the Chief Engineer and Surveyor, on or before the lst day of May, 1867, to appoint, by and with the advice and consent of Select Council, a competent person in each Survey District (who shall give bonds in one thousand dollars for the faithful performance of his duties) to make so much of bonds in one thousand dollars for the faithful performance of his duties) to make so much of the connection with the sewers as may be within the street lines, the same to be done under the supervision of the Survey Department, and the expenses thereof (excepting the repaying) to be defrayed by the person to whom the privilege is granted. The charges to be made by the respective persons so appointed for their services shall be uniform, and shall be established by ordinance of Councils. established by ordinance of Councils.

Section 3. After the connection with the sewer is made, it shall be the duty of the Commissioner of Highways, upon the written order of the Chief Engineer and Surveyor, to repaye the

the Chief Engineer and Surveyor, to repaye the street,
Section 4. When privilege is granted to connect with any sewer, the Department of Surveys is hereby authorized to issue a license, in the following form, as near as may be:—
SEWER LICENSE.
Whereas, (here insert the name of the applicant) has applied at the Survey Department to make a connection with the sewer located in (here insert the name) street, from his premises (here insert the number or a brief description of the premises), and has paid for the use of line, according to said application, the same to be made by (here insert the name of the proper person to make the connection), of the (here

The said licenses to pay the expenses thereof to said (here insert the name of the person appeinted by the Unief Engineer). This license to be revocable at the option of the city of Philadelphia, (Signed by the Chief Engineer and Surveyor.)

Section 5. That no dwelling-house, store, or Section 5. That no dwelling-bouse, store, or other building shail be erected or altered on any street or alley in which there is a sewer, without providing an underground connection by drain-pipes with the sewer for carrying off all drainage that would otherwise flow over the footway; and in all cases where there are gntters now over the footway which, in the opinion of the Chief Engineer and Surveyor, approved by the Committee on Surveys and Regulations, are objectionable, and are situated upon a street where there is a sewer, or where, in the erection of new buildings after the passage of this ordinance, the directions herein specified have been disregarded, it shall be the duty of the Chief Engineer and Surveyor to give written notice to the owner or occupants of the premises to connect with the sewer by underground drainage; and in case of non-compliance with said notice for the space of ninety days after the service thereof upon the owner or occupant, there shall be incurred by said owner the penalty of thirty dollars for each month of failure,

said owner the penalty of thirty dollars for each month of failure.

Section 6. No license shall be hereafter granted to make connection with a sewer for the purpose of preventing the overflow of a privy well, or carrying off water or fluid that will deposit sediment or obstruction in the sewer, and all such sewer connections now existing, when complained of by a citizen and approved by the Committee on Surveys and Regulations, shall be cut off by the Chief Commissioner of Highways within thirty days after written notice so to do has been served (by order of the Chief Engineer and Surveyor) upon the owner or occupant of the premises npon the owner or occupant of the premise

drained. Section 7. That in all cases where the connec tion is for the purpose of conveying to the sewer such drainage as would otherwise be per-mitted to flow across the footway, the license must be taken out in manner herein specified; but no charge shall be made therefor other than the sum of three dollars for repaying the car-

ringe-way. Section 8, 1t shall be the duty of each Passenger Railway Company occupying the streets of the city of Philadelphia, whenever the track of the city of Fhiladelphia, whenever the track may be over a sewer, to make, at their own expense, a connection between the horse-path of their track and the underlying sewer, at such points and in such manner as shall be ap-proved by the Chief Engineer and Surveyor; and upon the failure so to do within thirty days and upon the failure so to do within thirty days after the written notice has been given them by said Chief Engineer and Surveyor, it shall he the duty of the Chief Commissioner of Highways to have the same done, and the cost thereof to be collected from the Railway Company, as directed in section 10 of this ordinance. Section 9. That if a connection with any sewer is made in violation of the provisions of this ordinance, or it shall be used for purposes not specified in license, there shall be incurred by the person so using said sewer or making said connection improperly, the penalty of fifty by the person so using said sewer or making said connection improperly, the penalty of fifty dollars, and connection shall be severed.

Section 10. It shall be the duty of the City Solicitor to prosecute for all penalties incurred under this ordinance, upon the direction of the Chief Engineer and Surveyor.

Section 11. The Chief Engineer and Surveyor shall pay weekly into the City Treasury all moneys received, by him under the provisious bersof.

AN ORDINANCE CREATING A LOAN TO PAY CER-TAIN DEFICIENCIES, FOR THE PURCHASE OF THE LANSDOWNE ESTATE, AND FOR OTHER

Section 1. The Select and Common Councils of the City of Philadelphia do ordain, That the Mayor of Philadelphia be and he is hereby authorized to borrow, at not less than par, on the credit of the city, from time to time, one million eight hundred thousand dollars, to be applied as follows, viz. applied as follows, viz.:—

First. To pay deficiencies, one million five hundred thousand dollars.

Second. For the purchase of the Lansdowne Estate, and improvement of the same, one hundred thousand dollars. Third. For a House of Correction, one hundred

Third. For a House of Correction, one hundred thousand dollars.

Fourth. To pay the increase in the School Teachers' and House Cleaners' salaries, one hundred thousand dollars—for which interest, not to exceed the rate of six percent, per annum, shall be paid half yearly, on the first days of January and July, at the office of the City Treasurer.

The principal of said loan shall be payable and paid at the expiration of thirty years from the date of the same, and not before, without the consent of the holders thereof; and the certificate therefor, in the usual form of the certificates of City Loan, shall be issued in such amounts as the lenders may require, but not for any fractional part of one hundred dollars, or, if required, in amounts of five hundred or one thousand dollars; and it shall be expressed in said certificates that the loan therein mentioned, and the interest thereof, are payable free from all taxes.

Section 2. Whenever any loan shall be made by virtue thereof, there shall be, by force of this ordinance, annually appropriated out of the income of the corporate estates, and from the sum raised by taxation, a sum sufficient to pay the interest on said certificates; and the further sum of three-tenths of one per centum on the par value of such certificates is issued shall be appropriated quarterly out of said income and taxes to a sinking fund; which fund and its accumulations are hereby especially pledged for the redemption and payment of said certificates.
