Election Bribery Classified .- The Lancaster election commission in England finds that of 1339 persons who voted at the last election, excluding about 20 since dead, 932, or more than two-thirds, were bribed in sums varying rom £2 to £24. The number bribed by each party was about equal. Of the total number 460 were town freemen, 349 country freemen, and 123 householders. Subdividing them into classes, it appears that out of 41 merchants, manufacturers, and professional men upon the register, three received bribes; out of 88 voters described as of no occupation, and gentlemen of independent means, 13 received bribes: of 93 book-keepers, clerks, assistants, etc., 25 were bribed; of 258 tradesmen, including publicans and beer-house keepers, 70 were bribed; out of 400 artisans, 371 received bribes; and of 329 small shopkeepers and laborers, 281 were bribed.

More Mastoron Bones .- In digging away the debris from around the western end of the new Harmony mills, at Cohoes, the workmen on Thursday afternoon found another portion of the bones of the mastodon, consisting of the radius, or lower part of one of the fore-legs, and four bones of a foot. Professor Hall went up on Friday, and brought the new discoveries with him on his return to Albany. The Professor's theory is that the animal had fallen into the stream above and gradually floated down, decaying and decomposing, fragments detaching, and lodging or locating, until what remained deposited themselves in the hole where the bulk of the skeleton was discovered. The remains still undiscovered are probably in the rock still further west .--Albany Argus.
