A Spicy Letter.

General Brispin lately made an official state-ment that the enrolling officers had great diffi-culty in ascertaining the paternity of colored soldiers. Upon this the Louisville (Ky). Courier commented in severe terms, pronounce ing it an insult to the people of Kentucay, and becoming very personal to the General himself. The result is a letter to the Cincinnati (Onio) Gazette, which concludes as follows:-

'I never witfolly insulted any of them, but if a statement of facts insults them. I am not responsible; they should mend their habits. what if I should occasionally insult the Rebel people of the South? At Waeoling, Va., in 1860, they pulled hearly all the harrout of my head for no other offense than advocating the election of that good man, Abraham Lin coin. At Occoquan they tore my clothing and beat me. For three years past, not only myself and subordinate officers, but the ladies of our families, have been repeatedly and outrageously insulted by the Rebels of Kentucky. Not three days ago this unwashed Rebel openly iu-sulted General George H. Thomas, than whom a better man or purer patriot does not live. And yet the fellow talks about insulting people! A brass monkey would be a bashful beast beside the Editor of the Courier.

'It is asserted that I am a 'quarrelsome black guard and bully.' If men leave me alone I will narm no one; if they quarrel with me I will kill them if I can. I am warned to leave the State, but the Observer thinks, 'under the prostay.' Fifteen hundred loyal men have been murdered in the South since the close of the war, and I am well aware that if I were a citizen I could not live in Kentucky; but, thank God! I have still a tew bayonets about me, and I am here, if for no other reason than to witness the intolerance of such men as the editor of the Reporter. I nope the day will soon come when all such men will flee to the mountains, 'gnaw a file,' or look at God's sunlight through the bars of a prison window. The 'list of oattles' which is so fiercely called for is in the War Drpartment at Washington, and contains twenty-seven fights and three wounds to my credit. It is a matter of no concern to me whether the Rebels know my record or not. To the lies that for three years have been beaped upon me by the Rebel journals of Kentucky I have never before replied a word; but, lest some good people should believe I was one-balf as bad as the rum-sucking editors of these papers, I deem it proper to say this much. Abduction of a Young Girl from Cuba. ABREST OF SENOR CARLOS J. BARIERO, IN NEW YORK. On Monday last Inspector Dilks, of the Metropolitan Police Department, received a telegram from the Mayor of Baltimore, requesting the arrest and detention of Senor Carlos J. Barlero. arrest and detention of Senor Carlos J. Bariero, a wealtny Cuban, who was supposed to be in this city, and who stands charged with having abducted a girl named Adela Alleman, aged eleven years, from her home in Havana. Bariero, accompanied by the girl, had just left Baltimore for this city, and it was feared that he would leave this port for Europe. A description of the man and child accompanied the telegram.

Inspector Dilks placed the case in the hands of Officer Joseph Strauss and Detective Wilson, of the Central Department, and yesterday afternoon Bariero was seen by the officers in Four-teenth street, near Fourth avenue, in company with the girl, returning from a shopping ex-cursion, and was at once arrested. He sub-mitted quietly to his arrest, and was taken to the Police Headquarters in Mulberry street, where, on being searched, a loaded pistol was found about his person. He was locked up in one of the strong rooms attached to the De-tective Office, and the girl was placed in charge of Mrs. Ewing, the janitress of the building. noon Bariero was seen by the officers in Four-

Bariero states that he is thirty-nine years of age, a native of Cuba, and is a merchant. He was at one time private secretary to General of Prim, when that officer was Captain-General of Cuba, and subsequently a teller in one of the Cubs, and subsequently a teller in one of the banks in Havana. He is married, but, it is said, abandoned his wife twenty years ago, and for a number of years had been living with the mother of the child he abducted. He had brought up the child as though he was her father, and she had been taught to call him "papa." He further alleges that his reason for carrying the child off was that her mother was carrying the child off was that her mother was ill-treating her. He arrived at Baltimore from Cuba about ten days ago, and came to this city on Monday last.
