Mr. Johnson said he would like to know the reasons of Mr. Howard for departing from what has been the almost invariable rule of the Senate, which was to receive a Senator elect upon his credentials, and if he be not in point of fact a Senator, that has been made the subject of an investigation by the Judiciary Committee and of subsequent action. Before Mr. Howard assigned his reasons he (Mr. Johnson) hoped to be excused for availing himself of this occasion to say that, in point of loyally to the Government now, Mr. Thomas was just as acceptable as he (Johnson) was, or any member of this body.

Whatever might have been his opinions during the late war, or what might have been his opinions or the manner in which the war was conducted, he was satisfied that if he was admitted to a seat in this body he would be found worthy of the trust reposed in him, and observant of the oath which he was required to take. He had done nothing which would render it improper for him to take that oath. He (Mr. Johnson) had known Mr. Thomas so long and so intimately as to justify him injusying that, if he had done anything railing within the limit of that oath, he would be the last man in the world to take it.

That he was willing to take that oath was conclusive evidence that he had done nothing inconsistent with the duty he owes to the covernment.

Mr. Howard asid that personally he knew very little of Mr. Thomas, it was however, a matter of cammon rimor that the gentleman who was now an applicant for admitsion to the Senade sympathized with the Rebels in the late civil war.

One rumor which had reached him (Mr. Howard) was that Mr. Thomas performed an act tending togive aid and comfort to the Rebels during the existence of the late rumor, but judging from some remarks reported in the newspapefs as having fallen from the lips of the applicant after his election in Maryland, he would infer tha

Mr. Johnson did not know what rumors Mr Mr. Johnsen did not know what rumors Mr. Howard referred to, in station to any particular act of the Secator elect which had given aid and comfort to the Rebels.
