LATEST FROM WASHINGTON. [SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO EVENING TELEGRAPH.] WASHINGTON, March 18. A. H. Stephens' Position. The friends of Alexander H. Stephens deny that he has taken ground against the Congressional plan of reconstruction.

Various attempts were made in the House this morning to get his free action clause, rejected by the House.

Supplementary Reconstruction Bill. An effort will be made to get a vote to-day on the Senate Supplementary Reconstruction bill, under the previous question. It will not pass the House in the shape that it passed the Senate, and must go to the Committee of Conference, which will delay final action upon it.

The New Currency Measure. The bill introduced by Representative Hooper to-day, to amend the National Currency act, is similar to that reported by him last session from the Committee on Banks and Currency. There are no material changes. It is not proposed to call up this bill for action at present, but merely to have it printed in order that it may be considered during the recess, by the banks and others most interested in the subject.

Proceedings of Congress. Senate. Mr. Johnson (Md.) presented the credentials of Philip P. Thomas, Senator elect from Maryland, for six years, ending March 4, 1869, and who he sent, and that Thomas be sworn in.

Mr. Johnson said he would like to know the result of Mr. Hooper's report from the fact that he had been the subject of an investigation by the Judiciary Committee, and of subsequent action before the House.
