The total number of patients in the Hospital during the year was 516, and the average number under treatment was 310, or 152 males and

Since the opening of the Hospital, 2531 males and 2245 females have been admitted, and 4480 discharged, leaving 296 in the institution.

Of the whole number admitted, 2581 were natives of Pennsylvania, and 4015 were residents of Pennsylvania, though natives of various States and foreign countries. The following shows the number of single, married, widows, and widowers, in 4776 pattents:-

New Sewers .- Councils have by a speci ordinance provided for the construction of the following new sewers: -From the east side of Front street, upon the open channel of th Cobocksink creek (Canal street), to Laure street, thence on Laurel street to the Delawar river; one on Mifflin street and Montgomer avenue, from old Camac street to Sixth street on the open channel of the Cohocksink creek one on Ninth street, from Berks to Norris, o Norris to Eleventh, on Eleventh to Diamon on Diamond to Twelfth, on Twelfth to Day phin, and on Dauphin to Sixteenth; on Ellsworth and Twenty-fifth streets from the river Schuylkill to Federal street thence on Federal to Eighteenth street one on Norris, from Ninth to Memphis; or Memphis to Palmer, and on Palmer to the De laware river; one on Forty-third street (Mil Creek), from Oak street, to intersect the cree below Pine street; one on Broad street, from Clearfield street to Ontario; on Ontario to nea Seventeenth street; sewers on Seventeenth an Eighteenth streets, from Vine street northwar to Spring Garden street, to relieve the intersection of Eighteenth and Vine streets; sewers or Twelfth street, from Christian to Shippen, o Eleventh street, from Christian to Washington on Washington avenue, from Broad to Sevent street, to relieve the flooding at Twelfth street and Washington avenue; sewer on From street, from Read to Federal street, on Fron and Dickerson streets to Moyamen sing road, to relieve the intersection of Front and Reed streets; sewe on Thirteenth street, from Pennsylvania avenue to Jefferson street; on Locust street, and from the river Schuvlkill to Nineteenth street; one on North College avenue, from Twenty-fifth to Twenty-fourth street, thence to Oxford street, and from Oxford to Ridge avenue, with branch on Twenty-second street to Ridge avenue; sewer on Walnut street, from Thirty-third to Thirty-eighth street; one on the Darby road, from Thirty-ninth street to Mill creek; one on Lancaster avenue, Thirty-seventh, Warren and

Thirty sixth streets, to Filbert street.

The ordinance provides that after the plans and specifications are prepared for these cul-verts, scaled proposals for the construction of the same shall be advertised for, and that the contracts for the same shall be awarded to the

IMPROVEMENTS IN THE CITY LIMITS .- One hundred and sixteen permits for building and improving property were issued from the Building Inspectors' office during the present month. A handsome building is to be put up on the north side of Chesnut street, above Sixteeath, which is to be 244 feet front and 80 feet deep; also, one on the south side of Spring Garden street, below Broad, to be 20 feet front and 75 feet deep. One of the largest stone houses in the city is to erected on the north side of Arch street, above Third, which is to cover the whole of the lot of ground now vacant. Rev. D. D. Lyden, a resident of Germantown, has taken out a permit for the erection of a dwelling and school-house, at Evans and Hancock streets, to be 137 by 36 feet; also for the erection of a school-house at Centre and Evans streets, 44 by 74 feet. An addition of 38 by 114 feet is to be made to the factory at Mascher and Putnam streets; and a shop, 37 by 100 feet, three stories high, is to be put up on the site of one recently destroyed by fire, at the northeast corner of Twelfth and Brown streets. A handsome school-building, 90 by 65 feet, is to be put up on Ludlow street, east of Thirty-sixth, in West Philadelphia.

Carpenter street, from Fifteenth to Sixteenth, and in the rear on Morton streat for the same distance, is to be entirely built up. On Ells-worth street, west of Twentieth, thirty houses are going up, and on the same street, between Eleventh and Twelfth streets, an entire row of neat dwellings is to be erected. A large number of buildings are to be built on Fifteenth, Sixteenth, and Wharton streets.

It would be well, in this connection, to state that the ordinance directing all persons erecting buildings within the city limits, to have means provided to carry the refuse from the houses into the sewers, is being carried into effect. The Chief Engineer and Surveyor is now preparing to appoint twelve beensed agents, to be distributed over the city, under whose especial charge all sewer connections will hereafter be made, thus preventing the imperfect work and consequent inconvenience and damage to property which, in many cases, heretofore occurred. The Surveyor in each district will also have especial supervision of the work, and keep a record of each sswer con-
