She alleges that the young man has been in the habit of insulting her as she sat at a window, by flirting his hand kerchief and throwing kisses at her, and we bélieve she also charges him with speaking of her in such a manner as to prejudice her reputation On the other hand, the young man denies that he has been guilty of any act that should subject him to such an assault.
