# The Sunday Car Question-Has the Legis-lature Power to Delegate its Enacting Authority!

To the Editor of The Evening Telegraph .-

The Press, in its issue on Friday, under the head of "Sunday Cars-Debate in the Senate," after attempting, upon a pure technicality, to correct the error of Speaker Hall, who stated that "the observance of the Sabbath was part of the common law of England and the United. States, and that such law was local and could not be decided upon by citizens at a local election," ventures to assert that the question as to running the cars on Sunday in this city is entirely local; and that if a majority of the votes of the citizens at an election should be in favor of the cars running on Sunday, "such a law" would be "constitu-tional." tional.

We have long been under the schoolboy impression that the *legistative* power of the State was vested in the *Legislature*, consisting of a Was vested in the Lepisature, consisting of a Senate and House of Representatives, whose exclusive province is the *enaciment* of *laws*. The Constitution of the State so declares, and therefore all other power to enact laws must be excluded.

For the benefit of the Press and its learned juridical writers, that laws must be passed by the Legislature, and cannot be by a vote at an election, we refer to a decision of the Supreme Court of our State, made nearly twenty years ago, in the case of Parker vs. Commonwealth, reported in 6 Barr's Reports, page 507. There the Supreme Court held that "under the Constitution of Pennsylvania, legislative power must be exercised by the Legislature created by that Constitution. Hence the act of 1846, giving the citizens of certain counties the power to decide by a vote whether the sale of vinous and spirituous liquors shall be continued within such counties, and imposing a fine for the sale of such liquors, where a majority of the voters had been against such sale, is unconstitutional."

As the Legislature, according to this decision, cannot delegate its power to enact laws to the people in their primary capacity. it is not perceived, even under the enlightened legal notions of the Press, how the people at an election can assume power to enact laws COKE. even local in character.



DESPERATE FIGHT IN A DRINKING SALOON-MAN SHOT .- About 8 o'clock last evening a disturbance occured at a tavern at Thirteenth and Callowhili streets, and, after considerable fight-ing inside the building, the combatants were forced into the street. Policemen made their appearance and endeavored to arrest some of the parties prominent in the row, but an attack was made on the officers, and a rescue at-tempted. Osborne was taken to the Hospital. The policemen succeeded in quelling the disturbance and arresting several of the parties concerned.

RECOVERY OF STOLEN BONDS .- Some time ago, the \$16,060 worth of bonds that were stolen ago, the sto,000 worth of bohus that were stolen from Mr. Haug were returned by the thieves. Last Saturday, the tin box stolen from the office of Mr. James H. Newbold, broker, on Monday morning last, was recovered in the cellar of an unfinished house in Spring Garden street, with all the promissory notes and drafts in it, but not the \$6000 worth of Government bonds. recovery was due to an anonymous note left at the Central Police Station.

BADLY BEATEN .- Last evening James Durnell, while in a saloon at Race and Water streets, was attacked and severely beaten about the head and body. His injuries were of such a character that it was found necessary to take him to the hospital, where his wounds Were dressed. Subsequently he was removed to his home, at Twenty-sixth and Callowhill streets.


