AFFAIRS IN EUROPE.

Mons. Emile de Girardin and His Opinions of the Second Empire-How He Was Prosecuted and Fined for Publishing Some Unpleasant Truths-The Statue of Voltaire - What Garibaldi Thinks of It-The "Red, White, and Bine"-Its Arrival at Caen-A Letter from Captain Hudson, Etc. Special Correspondence of The Evening Telegraph.

AN UNGRATEFUL GUEST. The monotony of the present dulness has been somewhat relieved these last few days in Paris by the prosecution of the editor of La Liberté, the well-known and famous writer, M. Emile de Girardin, for attacking the empire, and even the Emperor himself. It is reported that the Emperor himself felt very much hurt and even indignant at the article published by M. de Girardin; the more so as the editor of La Liberté was a favored guest at the last festivities of Compeigne, and nothing led to the belief that a feeling so hostile existed as that which he has just given expression to. The article in question, which has made so much fuss in Paris and all over

France, might have been published with impu-

nity had our press been unshackled.

Mons. de Girardin, in this much-talked-of article, in alluding to the remarks made by Mons. Rouher, in his speech-"that the Emperor had conducted the country gradually and year by year to better destinies"asked, with an impudence which took aback the Minister, at what price the country had been so conducted ? With regard to foreign policy, three departments have been added to France since the Emperor has been on the throne-the Maritime Alps, Savoy, and Upper Savoy, with a total population of nearly a million of inhabitants. Mons. de Girardin tells ns that these acquisitions were made at the cost of a loan of 500,000,000 francs, contracted at 60f. 50c.; at the cost of the blood of Frenchmen shed to defend the Italians against the Austrians; also at the cost of the unification of Italy and Germany; and, finally, at the cost of the reorganization of the French army, involving the obligation on all able-bodied Frenchmen to military service-160,000 at least called out every year instead of an annual contingent of 100,000 men.

Mons, de Girardin runs the Government hard in his article. He gives it no quarter. He asks, too, what great influence has France gained in or out of Europe by the unfortunate Mexican expedition, in which French money and French blood have been most wantonly squandered? What has the present Government done to help the Poles? What is France doing to counterbalance the influence of Russia in the East? Mons, de Girardin then goes on to examine as to the state of things at home, in order to show that the statements of the Minister of Foreign Affairs are very far from being correct, when he says that France has gained considerably under the Second Empire. He says, as regards liberty, France is far below Germany, England, Belgium, Holland, Italy, Portugal, and Switzerland. Throughout the whole of Europe there is no country below France but Spain.

All the above-mentioned unpleasant truths have made the Minister wince not a little, and having lost his temper, he had the saucy editor of La Liberté prosecuted. The trial came off yesterday, and the verdict of the jury was that Mons. de Girardin should pay a fine of five thousand francs. We hear it was suspected for a moment that the article was suggested, if not written by "our dear cousin," Prince Napoleon; but the Prince has positively denied all knowledge of it until he read it in

VOLTAIRE'S STATUE.

Monsieur Houdin, the editor of the Siècle, an opposition paper, is progressing with his subscription in favor of a statue to be erected in Paris in memory of Voltaire. Among those who have sent in their adhesion, and fifty centimes, is Garibaldi. The adhesion is notified in the following short letter:-

CAPREBA, February 19.—A monument to Vol-taire in France signifies the return of this noble country to its post of advanced guard of human progress in the paternity of peoples. It is a good omen for the whole world, of which the immense man was citizen, and a terrible shock to the coalition of despotism and lying. Accer my obulus and all my gratitude. GARIBALDI.

THE RED, WHITE, AND BLUE.

The inhabitants of Havre had been awaitng the arrival of the Red, White, and Blue, the departure of which from London to Paris had the day previously been announced. After a very boisterous passage, the intrepid little yacht presented itself at the mouth of the Seine, but it was unable to sail up the river on account of the high winds. It was, therefore, obliged to take refuge in the river of Caen. Thus the hope of the inhabitants of Havre, who have been on the pier day after day on the lookout for the American boat, have been dashed to the ground.

Numerous parties have gone from Havre to Caen in order to have a look at the smallest three-master which certainly exists in the world. The Red, White, and Blue left London on the 1st of March, and put out to sea on the 2d, and entered Omsterham on the 4th, from whence it was towed to Caen by the

steamer Souvenir.

Captain Hudson has sent the following letter to one of his friends at Havre:-

letter to one of his friends at Havre:—
ON BOARD THE YACHT RED, WHITE, AND BLUE, CAEN, March 5—Dear Friend;—I have the pleasure to inform you that I have arrived safely here this morning at 0 o'clock. I, last night, caught sight of the Cape. Hove lights, but the wind was so high that there was not the slightest possibility of getting near shore. I therefore determined to follow a ship into the harbor of Caen. Should the wind not be favorable on Wednesday next, I shall cause the Red, White, and Blue to be towed out to sea, and from there I shall try to come into your port with the tide, either in the daytime or at night, just as the wind may prove favorable. just as the wind may prove favorable.

The daring shown by Captain Hudson has stimulated our Parisian fresh-water sailors. A sloop of twenty-four tons, eleven metres long, and having only four men on board, in-

cluding the captain, sailed on the 2d from Havre, with a complete cargo. It is believed that its destination is St. Thomas. The very stormy weather which it experienced obliged t to put into Cherbourg, in order to have the damages it received during the storm repaired. This little vessel, which is called the Sylph, was built in Paris. It is the smallest ship, after the Red, White, and Blue, which has attempted to cross the Atlantic.

PROPOSALS FOR A LOAN

\$23,000,000.

AN ACT

TO CREATE A LOAN FOR THE REDEMPTION OF THE OVERDUE BONDS OF THE COMMONWEALTH.

Whereas, The bonds of the Commonwealth and certain certificates of indebtedness, amounting to TWENTY-THREE MILLIONS OF DOLLARS, have been overdue and unpaid for some time past;

And whereas, It is desirable that the same should be paid, and withdrawn from the market

therefore. Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Penn-sylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the anthority of the same, That the Governor, Auditor-General, and State Trea-surer be, and are hereby, authorized and emsurer be, and are hereby, attainized and empowered to borrow, on the faith of the Commonwealth, in such amounts and with such notice (not less than forty days) as they may deem most expedient for the interest of the State, twenty-three millions of dollars, and issue certificates of loan or bonds of the Commonwealth for the same, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding six per centum per annum payable semi-annually, on the 1st of February and 1st of August, in the city of Philadelphia; which certificates of loan or bonds shall not be which certificates of loan or bonds shall not be subject to any taxation whatever, for State, municipal, or local purposes, and shall be paya-ble as follows, namely:—Five millions of dollars payable at any time after five years, and within ten years; eight millions of dollars paya-ble at any time after ten years, and within fif-teen years; and ten millions of dollars at any teen years; and ten millions of dollars at any time after fifteen years, and within twenty-five years; and shall be signed by the Governor and State Treasurer, and countersigned by the Auditor-General, and registered in the books of the Auditor-General, and to be transferable on the books of the Commonwealth, at the Farmers' and Mechanics' National Bank of Farmers' and Mechanics' National Bank of Philadelphia; the proceeds of the whole of which, loan, including premiums, etcetera, received on the same, shall be applied to the payment of the bonds and certificates of indebtedness of the Commonwealth.

Section 2. The bids for the said ioan shall be presented in the presence of the Governor Audit.

Section 3. The bonds of the State and certificates of indebtedness, now overdue, shall be receivable in payment of the said loan, under such regulations as the Governor, Auditor-General, and State Treasurer may prescribe; and every bidder for the loan now authorized to be issued, shall state in his bid whether the to be issued, shall state in his bid whether the same is payable in cash or in the bonds, or certificates of indebtedness of the Common-

Section 4. That all trustees, executors administrators, guardians, agents, treasurers, com-mittees, or other persons, holding, in a fidu-ciary capacity, bonds or certificates of indebt-edness of the State or moneys, are hereby authorized to bid for the loan hereby authorized authorized to bid for the loan hereby authorized to be issued, and to surrender the bonds or certificates of loan held by them at the time of making such bid, and to receive the bonds authorized to be issued by this act.

Section 5. Any person or persons standing in the fiduciary capacity stated in the fourth section of this act, who may desire to invest money in their hands for the benefit of the trust, may, without any order of court, invest the same in the bonds authorized to be issued by this act, at a rate of premium not exceeding twenty per centum.

Section 6. That from and after the passage of this act, all the bonds of this Commonwealth shall be paid off in the order of their maturity. Section 7. That all loans of this Commonwealth, not yet due, shall be exempt from State, municipal, or local taxation, after the interest due February 1st, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, shall have been Section 8. That all existing laws, or portions

thereof, inconsistent herewith, are hereby repealed.
