Witchcraft in Wales.

A noted quack in South Wales, calling himself "Dr. Harris," has just got into trouble. He was brought before the magistrates at Rhayader, a short time since, and the following evidence was given against him:—Thomas Mynor Lores and the state of the stat Jones said he arrived in England, from America, on the 5th of November last; he had been ill for a long time, and, having heard of Dr. Harris, consulted him. He met the doctor, was examined, and paid £2 down and £2 on the 21st of November. The doctor told him that he had been "witched" by a woman in America, wrote something on a piece of paper which he sewed in a bag, and told witness to wear it round his neck, but on no account to let the bag fall to the ground, or the charm would be broken. The doctor promised to show him in a glass the woman who had "witched" him, but he did not do so. He was no better, and though he had received medicine it had done him no good.

Edwin Jones, brother to last witness, said he too had consulted Dr. Harris, who made him lie down on a bed while he examined his chest, right knee and right arm, which he sald were out of joint, and that he too had been bewitched. paid him about £6 altogether, and Dr. Harris gave him a paper to wear, on which was written, "The fourth is Maynom, one of the powers who hath the ability of superficient administration and protection, that is at one and the same time to be present with many. His pre-sence oust be sought by humility and prayer. The fith good genius is Gaomum, an angel of celestial brightness, who bath the peculiar ability of rendering his pupil invisible to any evil spirit whatsoever."

The witness added that he saw Dr. Harris write the inscription, and the doctor told him that there was not such a man as he in Eng-land, Scotland, or Wales, but there was one in France who possessed the same powers. Samuel Phillips, of Builth, had been duped, and paid several instalments of ten shillings. The Doctor told him that if he did not give him more money he would "see him in h-," as he was master of "h- and the devils." He said he had been bewitched by a woman on Christ-

mas day.

Inspector Jones said the prisoner's name did not appear in the "Medical Register" for 1867, and that he had issued circulars calling himself "Doctor," and the reason he apprehended him was his obtaining money by talse pretenses as a medical man without a proper diploma. The magistrates committed the prisoner to take his trial at the next Radnorshire assuzes.
