A prominent Republican Senator said this morning that he would not be surprised if the Committee on Foreign Relations were to report in its favor early next week. It is not probable, however, that it will command a two-thirds majority at this session.

Registers in Bankruptcy. Chief Justice Chase has determined that only one Register of Bankruptcy is to be nominated by him for each Congressional District, and that they must be counsellors at law, recommended by their respective Congressmen and by the Judges of the district.

United States Senate-Special Session.

Washington, April 6.—Mr. Authony (R. I.), made a report from the Committee on Printing, against printing additional copies of the Report of the Commissioner of Agriculture, but providing that 1900 copies of those heretotore ordered be furnished to that office, in order to most the demands on him.

Mr. Chandier (Mich.) remarked that the Senate had hitherto been very liberal towards nominees, and as an instance of how they expressed their gratitude he caused to beread an article from The Philadelphia Levening Telegraphia.

The Clerk read it, in substance, that a compilmentary screnade was on Thursday night tendered to John W. Frazier, confirmed as Assessor of finternal Revenue for the First District of Pennsylvania. This gentleman is reported to have said, in acknowledging the honor, that a number of his radical friends have invited him to return to the fold, which he declined. He did not consider himself under any obligation to the Senate, for he was appointed to fill a vacancy. Politically, he was still a conservative, in favor of Johnson. PENNSYLVANIA LEGISLATURE.

Senate.

HARRISHURG, April 6.—Nearly three hundred private and local bills were reported from the various committees.

General Fisher moved the reconsideration of the vote on the final passage of the supplement to the act for the inspection of buildings in Philadelphia, giving the appointment of Inspector to the Court of Common Pleas, which was agreed to, and the bill was postponed.

The Appropriation bill came up on the second reading. The new provision reported by the Senate Committee, repealing the law granting pensions to indigent solders of 1812, being under consideration, Messrs. Wallace, McConaughy, Lowry, and Bigham spoke against the repeal. Messrs. Landon and Brown, of Mercer, in favor of it.

General Fisher appealed to the Senate to retain the law providing for the old solders.
