HARBISBURG, April 10—The bill incorporating the Pennsylvania and New Jersey Bridge Company: the bill extending the provisions of the act to authorize the arrest of professional thieves, burgiars, etc., in the city of Philadelphia; to anthorize the arrest of professional counterfeiters and forgers; the bill ratifying the charter of incorporation of the Atlantic Petroleum Storage Company, and to confer additional powers on said corporation; the act amending the charter of corporation of the Decatur Association of Frankford; the bill incorporating the Willow Bank and Burns' Spring Railroad Company of Centre county; the bill explaining the Express Steambert Company; the bill explaining and construing the act compelling railroad and other corporations to pay the counsel fees of plaintiffs in certain cases where a company shall repudiate a bond or courtact; and the act locating a part of the fownship line road in the Twenty-first Ward of Philadelphia, were all passed.

the Twenty-first Ward of Philadelphia, were all passed.
The bill for the better preservation of the morals of minors of the city of Philadelphia was disagreed to.
The bill requiring the Superintendent of Public Printing to advertise for proposals for supplying the state with printing and bill paper was passed finally.
The bill changing the rate of interest from six to seven per cent, was postponed.
The act prohibiting political processions after dark ten days next preceding any general election in the city of Philadelphia was passed.
The bill relative to the estate of Eliza Howard Burd, of Philadelphia, refunding \$12,000 collateral inheritance tax from the State Treasury, was laid over.

Mr. Donovan moved that the Committee be dis-charged from the consiedration of an act relative to the salaries of officers in Philadelphia, recommended by City Councils, so that the bill might be passed. He made a similar effort in reference to the Gas Trust bill, but the Speaker ruled him out of order. Mr. Connell reported the House bill relative to the taxation of property in Philadelphia, which was so amended as to exempt all places of religious worship, the Pennylvania University, the Academy of Fine Arts, and all asylums and orphans' homes. The bill was takented.

The act to increase the revenues of the Commonwealth oy a tax upon shares in National Banks was called up by Mr. Connell, and passed finally. It provides for a tax of three mills on a dollar on the actual value of stocks, to be assessed as other property. The

The act appointing Inspectors of Stationary Steam Engines in Philadelphia was defeated.

Enabling police officers to enforce order in licensed houses, and to exterminate unlicensed traffic: incorporating the Ashbury Life Insurance and Trust Company; providing for paving the footways in the First Precinct of the Twenty-fifth Ward of Philadelphia; and the bill incorporating the Artillery Corps of and the bill incorporating the Artillery Corps of Washington Greys. An act to levy a tax upon horses kept for pleasure or hire in Philadelphia was postponed indefinitely.
