CRYSTALLIZED CARDS DANGEROUS .- The cards

recently introduced by the New York engravers, known as "crystallized," or "snowflaked," are dangerous for ordinary purposes, it seems. The London Paper Trade Review cautions the public against the paper used in their manufacture, and says: - "It appears that the pearly appearance is communicated to the paper by the use of sugar of lead; and, on analysis, it has been found that a card measuring five and a half by three inches, contains no less than seven grains of that poisonous substance." But, if even the mother o' pearly look that the cards have, is admitted to be pretty (which it is not), the peculiar brilliancy on the surface is but very temporary, for the lustre almost entirely disappears if the card be carried in the pocket a few days, and is subject to the least friction. More than this, the cards so prepared carry with them a very disagreeable odor, so that, with their unpleasantness to the olfactory nerves, and their very flashy appearance, they are certainly not in good taste; and, now that they are known to be poisonous, they will assuredly not become popular. We hope not, at all events, for they are offensive to any person of taste and refinement.

Obiois or Chionoss.-It is remarkable that the African ladies first introduced a very inferior kind of chignon, natural, and formed of their own hair. It is minutely described in the last entertaining volume of M. du Chaillu. This enterprising traveller found the Ishogo belies cultivating a remarkable sort of chignon. The hair is trained into tower-shaped masses, eight to ten inches high, and, as the illustrations show, in three distinct styles, projecting obliquely, horizon-tally, and vertically from the crown. The structure requires years of careful training ere it reaches the perfection attained by Ishogo leaders of fashion. A really good chignon is not attained till the age of twenty or twenty-five, "It is the chief object of ambition with young Ishogo women to possess a good, well greased tower of hair." In Europe (and in this country, sad to say), it is the ambition of every fashionable young lady to wear at the back of her head an artificial chignon, composed of hair cut from the heads of others, either living or dead. In Ishogo, "once fixed, these chignons remain for a couple of months without requiring to be rearranged, and the mass of insect-life that accumulates on them during that period is truly astonishing."

Silk.—Heliogabalus was the first Roman who were a garment all silk, which must have been about the year 220 A. D. The Emperor Aurelianus, who died in 275, denied his empress a robe of silk because it was too dear. In the year 555, some monks, who had been in India, brought some eggs of the silk worm to Constantinople, where, in time, they produced raw silk, which was manufactured at Athens, Thebes, Corinth, etc. Charlemagne sent Offa, King of Mercia, a present of a belt, and two silken vests, in the year 780, which is the earliest account we have of silk being in England.
