SKETCH OF THE LATE WILLIAM BULLOCK. The sad accident which befell Mr. Bullock, and so lately proved fatal, has been adverted to before by THE EVENING TELEEBAPH. The remains of him who was so well known were yesterday removed to ritt=burg, atter an im-pressive funeral service at his late residence, in Jefferson street.

in Jefferson street. Mr. Bullock was born in Greenville, Green county, New York, in 1813, was left an orphan when he was but S year-old, and was taken into the tamily of his brother, with whom he subse-quently learned the trade of iron founder and machinist, at Catskill, New York. He soon became an expert in pattern-making, and the castings from his wors, young as he was more castings from his wors, young as he was, were the smoothest turned out from the shop. He obtained access to books on subjects connected with his business, and studied them diligently. with his business, and studied them diligently. About the year 1836 he went into business on his own account, at Prattsville, New York. A few years after this he went to Savannah, Ga., with shingle machinery. Keturning to New York city, he engaged in the manufacture of artificial limbs, and subsequently in making hay and cotton presses of his own invention. He was also engaged there as a mechanical engi-neer. About the year 1849 he came to Phila-delphia and opened a patent agency office in Dock street, and at the same time commenced Dock street, and at the same time commenced the publication of the Banner of the Union. This paper he continued until 1853, when he removed to Catskill, New York, sold it out, and commenced the American Eagle. While pub-lishing this paper he was deprived of his press, and immediately commenced his inventions in

printing machinery. Working hard he fitted up a press on which to strike off the next copy of the paper. It was a wooden cylinder, worked by a hand crank. After this he turned his whole attention to

the invention of his ingenious machine. In 1856 he went to New York city, and spent three years there in constructing his first machine, and in trying to perfect it and the feeding appa-ratus referred to. In 1859 he removed to Pittsburg, where he associated himself with several others, and commenced building printing machines according to his latest model. There are nine of these machines now in use. As man, he was noted for his gentle manners, and at the same time he possessed great force of character and will. He was never dishcartened by difficulties, delays, or obstructions. By his death the country loses a valuable mechanical
