REVIEW OF NEW BOOKS.

FRITHIOF'S SAGA. From the Swedish of Esais Yegner, by Rev. William L. Blackley, M. A. Edited by Bayard Taylor, Leypoldt & Holt, New York. Philadelphia Agents: J. B. Lippincott & Co.

"Frithiof's Saga" bears the same relation to Swedish literature as the "Iliad" of Homer does to the Greek classics. It is universally conceded in Sweden the foremost rank, as the type of the ablest native genius.

The translation of the poem is as nearly literal as possible. It is an epic composed of a series of lyrics strung together, each in a different metre, but the series forming a complete and closely connected tale.

"For woman loves a manly deed, And beauty's praise is valor's meed; The one is suited for the other, As head and helmet matched together."

"Frithiof's Saga" is a most welcome addition to our literature, and Messrs. Leypoldt & Holt deserve great credit for the class of foreign works which they are enriching our libraries.

It is prefaced by a life of the author by Bayard Taylor.

SILVER HEAD.—DOUBLE DECEIT. Comedies by Langston Osborne. New York: Doubleday Philadelphia Agents: J. B. Lippincott & Co.

The second volume of a series of dramatic compositions which are being published by Mr. Osborne, is the work containing "Silver Head" and "Double Deceit." We cannot but think that the author is a much better composer of comedies than of the sublime tragedy at which he aimed in his first volume.

They do not show a surpassing genius. We do not think that a new era in the drama is indicated by their appearance. They are efforts at which the author need not blush, but they cannot be awarded a prize for power nor yet for originality. Their chief merit consists in the exceeding care with which the proofs have been read. They are got up in the excellent style of Mr. Doolady.

THE OLD PATRON. By James A. Maitland. T. B. Peterson & Brothers.

"The Old Patron" is an absorbing novel. It treats of vast property possessions under the grants of the Dutch, and the struggle for their ownership. It is skillfully worked up, and the plot is well developed. It is issued in the handsome style which has characterized the latest publications of the Messrs. Peterson, and will have a deservedly large sale.

The fourth series of "Afternoon Lectures" contains several papers of considerable interest; one, "The History of English Sonnets," by the Archbishop of Dublin; another on "Matthew Arnold's Poetry," by Dean Alexander; and a third by J. K. Ingram, on "Tennyson's Works." The lectures in question were delivered in the Theatre of the Museum of Industry, Dublin.
