Land Office Returns.

The Commissioner of the General Land Office has received the returns of Townships 21, 22, 23, and 24, north, through ranges 1, 2, and 3, west, in Madison county, Nebraska, situated on both sides of the Elk Horn river, a tributary of the Platte, and covering an area of 277,336 acres. The region is generally a rolling prairie. with considerable bottom land along the Elk Horn and several small creeks flowing into that river. The lands are valuable for agricultural purposes.

Small bodies of timber cotton-wood are found along the Elk Horn, which is a scream having a rapid current and high banks, affording good water power for manufacturing purposes.

With the foregoing surveys the jurisdiction of the Surveyor-General at Leavenworth is terminated as to Nebraska. This new State now forms by law a separate surveying district, the office of the Surveyor-General of which is to be situated at Plattamouth, Nebraska. The Commissioner has issued the requisite instructions to the new Surveyor-General Mr. Hitchcock, to enable him to immediately commence business
