To the Editor of The Evening Telegraph:-I read with considerable pleasure your editorial relative to legislative corruption and venality, that are so unblushingly displayed in rial relative to legislative corruption and venality, that are so unbiushingly displayed in the General Assembly of this State, as well as in the State of New York. The public mind has for years brooded over, sullenly and silently, this monstrous evil and wrong, without the power to apply a remedy. The political machinery of parties, both Republican and Democratic, has been securely seized by the lowest order of intelligence and honesty in all our cities and larger towns; and the rosult is, like has produced like, and we have been represented these latter years in our Legislatures by elections unfit to be made. I am not very young, neither am I very old, and I cannot tell how far back in our history commenced the system of bribery and corruption in our public bodies which we so much deplore, and which seems to be breaking up the very foundations of our free institutions. The first great sale of political and personal integrity which took very decided shape in Pennsylvania, was that connected with the recharter of the old United States Bank, as a State institution. From that time down to the present the public ear has grown more and more familiar with such transactions, and we now cease to marve at time down to the present the public ear has grown more and more familiar with such grown more and more laminar with such transacti ins, and we now cease to marvel at any fraud or any wrong that those whom we choose to mis-represent us may see fit to perpetrate. The time was when our best citizens were chosen to be our law-givers-men of in-tegrity, or probity, of intellectual culture, and of social and moral worth.

In the earlier days of the Republic we heard of no letrayal of the people's interests, no violence done to the honor and dignity of the legislative character, when the Sergeauts, the Tolands, the Biddles, the Dallases, the Penroses, and a host of others of like character were selected to do the business pertaining to the government of the State, But as your editorial, to which I allude, im-

plies, almost the entire foreground of our re-presentation has been changed. From the best of men as Representatives, we have fallen down to a class that no man who respects himself cares to associate with in public, and certainly not in private life; and we now seek to correct the evil. It is easier to talk about a remedy than to apply one. The present system if party selection is a cheat and a franc; and yet how

can we escape it?

The can didate who can secure with rum and money the "roughs," usually secures the nomination, and no matter how many votes an honorable and honestopponent may poil at the window of a primary party nominating contest, unless he has the inside judge and inspectors he will be declared in the minority. There is no rearess for the wrong, and the fraud is so obvious, that high-minuted and competent men no recress for the wrong, and the fraud is so obvious, that high-minued and competent men care not to enter the arena where rum has more influence to control than purity of character and intellectual qualifications. The evil to be dreaded in defeating such unfair nominations on election day, you very fairly present. So for the public good we submit to the private wrong.

But, Mr. Editor, there is another side to this picture—a lesture of biame which attaches itself to the press, and also to the community. We have become so accustomed to the cry of "med dog," that we make an indiscriminate accusation of corruption against every one of our legislators. I am not prepared to judge thus hurship of all who go to Harrisburg or Albany. I believe that many of them are borney. bany. I believe that many of them are honest and conscientious men—men who go and come untainted by corrupting influences, It does not require that the whole of a Legislature should be bought, to pass unjust and partial laws. Twenty bad and corrupt men—having talent and recklessness—can easily control the balancing power of one balancing to the control of the balancing power of one balancing to the control of the balancing power of the control of the balancing power of the control balancing power of one hundred men. I can speak from some little experience in this matter. Therefore, when the press and the community denounce all as venal who assume the character of legislators, a serious wrong is perpetated. And it has this bad effect—it deters men of ability honesty and integrity for the desired of ability, honesty, and integrity from desiring to fill such positions, or allow their names to be used in connection therewith. This is the point I wish to make in this article:—As long as this indiscriminate hue and cry is continued against all who go to Harrisburg, only bad men will seek to go there, and only bad men will be successful in their seeking. Justice requires that we should discriminate in our denunciations as well as in our praise.
