In every city where Ristori has performed the most brilliant offers are made, without regard to terms, for her reappearance; but, as her stay is limited and her departure fixed, all

applications have to be declined. In cities like Albany, Troy, Utica, Syracuse, Rochester, Buffalo, Cieveland, Pittsburg, and Detroit, where managers guaranteed nightly from \$2000 to \$2500 net, free of all expenses, managers have gained from \$1000 to \$1800 each representation.

The most curious fact is that the last six representations were given in Holy Week, when amusements generally are almost suspended. They were as profitable as any nights, and produced equal enthusiasm, and the same managers are incessant in their applications for more representations. The original contract was signed at Verona in September, 1865, by Mr. Grau, for one hundred and twenty representations, to be given in the United States and Havana; but there has not been time found to leave the United States, or even to visit many

cities of this country.

M'me Ristori has performed from five to six times each week since September, besides travelling about eighteen thousand miles. With the exception of New Orleans and Mobile, no Southern city could be visited, and Havana had to be deprived of hearing Ristori.

Ristori was rich before coming to this country. She owns No. 48 Boulevard Malesherbes, a splendid rainis, which was completed before the left for America, at a cost of 2.000,600 francs. She owns, also, a spiendid paiois in Florence, now occupied by the Russian ambassador. It cost 1,500,000 frans. All this property was earned by her exertions. She owns, siso, several splendid mansions in Rome. Her visit to America was to add the jewel of this country to the crown earned in the countries of the Old World, and to increase the fortunes of her interesting family. A greater success has never attended any artist's labors, and all those who have predicted that Mr. Grau's immense enterprise would be dangerous. managers as well as critics, find, from the results, that they have erred egregiously in judgment. The success is a proof that great talents are always appreciated in this country, -N. Y.


