NEW BUILDING STATISTICS .- Despite the high prices of building material, the cost of labor, and the strikes of working men, there are a goodly number of buildings at present in course of erection in the various quarters of the city. The Building Inspectors issued in April 504 per-mits for new buildings. Of that number there were for dwellings, 399-four-storied, 7; three-storied, 179; and two-storied, 212; bath-houses, 8; bank, 1; churches, 3; dye-house, 1; ooachhouses, 2; depots, 2; engine-house, 1; foundries, 2; factories, 7; ice-house, 1; offices, 11; rolling mill, 1; sheds, 3; shops, 25; school-houses, 2; shaughter house, 1; stables, 12; stores, 15; tavern. 2; tenpin alley, 1; warehouses, 4. There were also issued 167 permits for additions and alterations.

DEATH OF A CLERGYMAN .- Rev. J. Gordon Maxwell, rector of Emanuel Protestant Episcopal Church, died yesterday at his residence, No. 1505 Girard avenue, in the fifty-second year of his age. The tuneral will take place on Saturday morning next, from his residence, and will proceed to Emanuel Church, where funeral services will be performed.

COUNTERPEIT FIVE CENT PIECES, of the similitude of the first issue of the coin, have been extensively in circulation in this city within the past few days. They very closely resemble the genuine coin, but being made of lead, have a greasy feel, and may be detected in the dark by rubbing them between the thumb and finger.

MR. WILLIAM R. HEINS, for a number of years past a telegraph operator at the Central Station, has resigned, to enter upon his duties as an Alderman of the Nineteenth Ward. Mr. Heins succeeds Mr. Stuart Field, whose term of office expires on the 1st proximo.

TAVERN LICENSES .- The applications for tavern licenses come in very slowly, consider-ing that so short a time remains for making them. So tar, only about 2500 ont of the 4000 them. So far, only about 2500 out of the 4000 granted last year pave made their appearance at the office of the City Commissioners.

FATAL ACCIDENT .- About half-past 4 o'clock vesterday afternoon, Cornelius O'Leary, aged 45 years, was run over and killed by a train of cars on the Reading Radroad, near the Columbia bridge. The body was taken to the late residence of the deceased, near by.
