IMPORTANT FROM WASHINGTON.

The Indian Commission.

General Gatley, President of the Indian Commission, now in the Northwest, informs the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, under date of Commissioner of Indian Affairs, under date of April 25, of an interview with twenty of the Brule and Ogadalla tribes of Sloux Indians, near East Sedgwick, at the junction of Lodge Pole Creek and the south fork of the Platte. The Indians had come down from the North to keep out of the way of hostilities, and their party consisted of forty lodges. They say that they met a party of Winneconjons, who told them that the whites had killed all the Brules who had gone south. This story was told them with the evident intention to incite the Brules to hostility. These Sloux met the party who stole the mules from Fort Mitchell, a short dis-tance east from Laramic. They were only six in number, and were Winneconjons. These people represent the Sloux as greatly divided in sentiment and widely separated, part of them being near the mouth of Tongue river, a tributary of the Yellowstone, part at the mouth of the Yellowstone, and part making their way over to the Missouri to keep out of heavities.

their way over to the Missouri to keep out of nostlitties. The Brules, they say, are mostly desirous of


