From 1838 until the present time the Society have occupied the building No. 386 Wainut street, which is now entirely too small and inconvenient for the great growth and continued prosperity of the institution. Thirty-one years ago it had but seven thousand depositors; they now number twentytwo thousand, and the market value of their surplus is not less than \$750,000. In order that accommodation can be had for the increased business of the Society, Caleb Cope, Esq., has, we understand, concluded the purchase of the Randall property, at the southwest corner of Walnut street and Washington, square, and the adjoining property of Edward Waln, Esq., making, together, ol feet on Walnut street by 175 feet in depth, and on this will be creeted a building more convenience. building more commodious and suited to the wants of the Society.

Caron, acting paying teller of the Sixth National Bank of this city, was arrested at the instance of the officers of that institution, on the charge of having embezzled funds belonging to the bank. Caron was taken before Alderman Dougherty, who held him in \$18,000 bail to answer the charge. The amount of the alleged defalcation is about \$4000, for which the ban': is amply secured.
