Distillers are nowalso required to apply for a new patented meter, furnished by Government at the expense of the distiller, which registers all the spirits that pass through the still, and it is said to be a complete check on the distiller against fraud. The penalty for being without a license is \$500 and imprisonment for not less than two years.

OF IMPORTANCE TO THE OWNERS OF CANINES-A NEW ORDINANCE TO BE ENFORCED. - The law prohititing dogs from running in the streets without muzzles went into effect on the 9th instant, but the enforcement of its provisions was not commenced until yesterday. Mr. Palmer, the member of Common Council from the Thirteenth Ward, has prepared a supple mentary ordinance, which prohibits dogs from running at large at any time during the year without muzzles, and also extending the provisions of the law to those portions of the city now exempt.

THE FRE BILL for the April term of the Quarter Sessions, just returned to the Controller, shows that the following amounts were paid by the city :- District Attorney's fees, \$1736; Clerks, \$676.10; Sheriff, \$585.75. The Grand Jury during the term acted upon 427 bills, a large number of which were ignored. Of those returned as true, only 82 of the persons charged were declared to be guilty.

A DANTE ENCYCLOPÆDIA.—Professor Ferrazzi has lately published the third volume of his "Encyclopædia Dantesca," a valuable work, which will be completed in four volumes. The matter embraced in it involves, as the title implies, every species of knowledge relating to Dante and his times, biographic, historic, critical, and philologic, in the shape of indices, extracts, commentaries, disquisitions, essays, etc. The bibliographic section includes co pious lists and notices of foreign translations of Dante, and works concerning him and his writings, as well as the various Italian editions and works of the same character. Professor Ferrazzi shows himself, says one of his critics, to be a genuine Dantesque scholar and enthusiast, and has devoted to his task a deal of single-minded industry, which will fitly be met by the honorable status to be assigned to his book in the literature of Dante. In addition to its specialty, his book contains interesting notices of Petrarch, Ariosto, and Tasso.
