THE STORM OF THE 5th AND 6th ON THE LOWER MISSISSIPPI.

GREAT DESTRUCTION AND OVERFLOW OF THE LOWER COAST-SEVERAL CREVASES SOLDIERS' QUARTERS AT FORT ST. PHILIP OVERFLOWED—FORE PRET OF WATER IN THE MAGAZINE—THE HOSPITAL BUILDINGS AT PORT JACKSON DAMAGED -ORBAT DISTRESS OF THE INHABITARTS ALONG THE LOWER COAST.

The officers of the steamer A. G. Brown, frem Fort Jackson, report having experienced a very heavy gale on the 5th and 6th instant, the river below the city, which lasted thirty-six hours. The back-water from the bay rose several feet, overflowing the soldiers' quarters at Fort St. Philip, and entering the main buildings. Four feet of water is re ported in the powder magazine. The hospital buildings at Fort Jackson are considerably damaged, the roof being partly blown off. The Magstaff inside the fort is down, and there is back-water all around the quarters.

At Buras settlement the levees are broken; also at Mrs. H. L. Smith's and Dr. Westerfield's. The United States survey schooner was blown ashore near Mrs. Johnson's landing; there is a break threatened at Bernard Fasterling's; the landing was washed away at Captain Brainard's, and the water is running over the levee. A crevasse occurred at Tropical Bend, below the place of Alfred Ruiz, and several buildings are in the water. The orange trees and rice crops in the vicinity are probably ruined. The inhabitants all along Buras settlement are in great distress.

The levees are also broken at Blanchmones and Bellevne plantations, and at Petit Prairie. The water is running over the levees at Point Michel, and there is a crevasse at Richland. fifty miles below the city, about three hundred yards in width, with all the old and new levees

The people along the lower coast require immediate assistance from the Board of Levee Commissioners, if that body has any means at its disposal.—N. O. Times, 10th.

Arrest of Counterfeiters.

TROY, May 13 .- The great raid upon the counterfetters still continues, a large number of arrests having been made since my last despatch on this subject. Among them the notorious Ed. Webb, keeper of a sporting house on the Lansingburg road, J. H. Sickles, tavern keeper at Stillwater, Saratoga county, and Robert Mathews, of Pitisburg, Pennsylvania. The two former have been held, while the latter was discharged. The \$100 counterfeit bills, so many of which were recently passed at New Orleans and detected, were made by the gang lately arrested

and now confined at Eochester.

The United States Court, Judge Nathan K.
Had, opened at Rochester to-day, and it is expected that the counter feiters will be arraigned to-morrow or next day. Owing to some of the parties having turned State's evidence, it is confidently believed that some starting revelations will be made, and that the damaging evidence thus gained will materially tend towards the breaking-up of the counterfeiting system for a long time to come, at least in this section of the country. It is known that a large number of American counterfeiters, alarmed at the present surroundings of the system, have taken refuge The United States Marshal informs me that their arrest is but a question of time.-N. Y. Herald.

"DEAD HEADS."-In answer to a lady cor-

respondent who desires to know the meaning of the term "dead head," the Davenport (Iowa) Gazette says:- "The free tickets given to the press for the uses named are always paid for, and that very liberally. As a rule, those who issue—not those who receive—these free tickets are the 'dead heads.' usually giving fifty sents for that which a five dollar bill would not adequately pay for. So long as the newspaper editor is expected to give liberal notices of entertainments before they occur, and then follow these with a generous puff after the show is over, he certainly has no place in the 'dead head' classification. Indeed, in nine cases out of ten the editors would be glad to receive half-pay for their work and pay two prices for the free ticket. They certainly would make money by the operation. We may add a few words on the general subject of advertising. The publication of advertisements is as much in the business of a newspaper as the publication of the news, and an editorial notice which is designed to supply the place of or add value to a regular advertisement, has even less claim to a gratuitous insertion than would such an advertisement. Yet there are those who ask just such gratuitous notices, and this almost as a matter of right. If these same persons should be asked to make a present of a dozen yards of muslin to each purchaser of a merino dress, or a dollar's worth of sugar to whoever bought three pounds of tea, or half-a-dozen 'free tickets' to whoever engaged twenty seats at a concert, they would resent the demand as an insult. Yet why should not their wages be given away as freely as should and are the products of the editor's and publisher's labor and capital? The merchant makes his profit and living by selling his goods. The publisher of a newspaper makes his by selling his advertising columns, not by giving them away; and when he does thus give them in aid of a public library or ether beneficial object, he deserves thanks as a public benefactor, and not insults as a 'dead-
