SCHOOL BUILDINGS .- In addition to the schools mentioned as reported (avorably, in our report of the proceedings of Select Council yesterday, one is to be built on Christian street, above Front, in the Third Ward, and another on Fourth street, above George, in the Sixteenth Ward.

The citizens of the Seventeenth Ward, adjoin-

ing, are suffering sadly for the want of school accommodations, and have been for a long time.

A resolution has been passed in the Board of Control requesting Councils to set apart \$45,000 out of the million loan, for the erection of a proper school house in the Seventeenth Ward. This will remedy much of the evil.
