WASHINGTON, May 22. (SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO EVENING TELEGRAPH.)

The following are extracts from letters received by the Commissioner of the General Land Office:

From Dr. Hayden, recently appointed to make a geological survey of the State of Nebraska:

"It is my purpose to spend every dollar in accumulating materials for my next work, to trace the coal beds into Nebraska. Mr. Gill is with him. I shall start in a week with my outfit complete for work. I shall send you by express some photographs of Western scenery, which I desire to form part of the archives of the survey. The picture of the Sioux Falls, Dakota Territory, you can use for your report, if you desire. The rocks are red quartzite, in which the red pipestone is located. The falls form the finest water power in the West, and will, at some future day, be of immense value."

Dr. Hayden in another letter says: "I have this day forwarded some photographs of the scenery, which I hope will be of service to you in forming an idea of the country. If the money will permit, I shall endeavor to have some of the most interesting points in the photographs, and forwarded to you at once. I have the promise of photographs from portions of the neighboring Territories."

JEFF. DAVIS.

JEFFERSON DAVIS LEFT THE CITY FOR MONTREAL, Monday night for Montreal. Hardly a dozen persons were aware of his departure at the time. His family followed him yesterday. At the depot of the Hudson River Railroad, in Thirtieth street, there was quite a gathering of curiosity seekers during the afternoon, who had congregated to see the departure of the ex-Rebel chief, but witnessed only that of his family. At twenty minutes to 3 o'clock the "bus of the New York Hotel" drove up to the depot, loaded with baggage, and a colored man sitting on the box beside the driver. A spruce, middle-aged gentleman, with grey hair and mustache, and a ruddy countenance, turned out first, and saluted a tall, handsome, matronly lady to alight. These were followed by two servants, having in charge a little child. These persons were the wife of Jefferson Davis, his brother and child, and two of his servants. They started off on the 3 o'clock train. It was reported at the depot that Jefferson Davis would meet his family at Peleah in N. Y. Herald.

DISAPPOINTMENT OF THE ALBANIANS. ALBANY, N. Y., May 21.—Quite a crowd of persons gathered at the Delavan House to-night, expecting to see Jeff. Davis, but they were disappointed, as he passed directly through on his way to Canada.

ARRIVAL OF THE DAVIS FAMILY AT TROY. TROY, N. Y., May 21.—The following despatch was received in this city at noon to-day:—"New York, May 21.—To Conductor James B. Baldwin: Please reserve two sections for Mrs. Jefferson Davis on three forty-five train here for Montreal."

Mrs. Jefferson Davis and party, consisting of five persons, including two colored servants, passed through here for Montreal to-night, on the 10 o'clock train, as reported from them by Mr. Davis himself passed through on the same route last night entirely incognito, not being once recognized or suspected during the whole trip from New York to Montreal, where he arrived safely this morning. The party passing through to-night did so very quietly, the consist of a party of five persons, including two colored servants, and a temporary crowd gathered about Conductor Baldwin's sleeping car, in hope of catching a glimpse of the fallen hero, in which they were disappointed. The party quietly took to their berths, and the train passed out of the depot on time.

ARRIVAL OF JEFF. DAVIS IN MONTREAL.—A VERY QUIET RECEPTION—HIS FRIENDS TO VISIT HIM TO-DAY, ETC.

MONTREAL, May 21.—Jefferson Davis arrived here this morning, accompanied by three or four gentlemen, and looking very well. His reception was very quiet. He drove at once in a covered carriage to his home. His arrival was not generally known for some hours. It is supposed that the cavalry will call on him to-morrow.

United States Census for 1860 and 1866. According to the census of 1860, the organized States and Territories contained 31,443,321 inhabitants; of whom 488,970 were free colored, and 3,653,700 were slaves of African descent. In addition to the above it is estimated that there were 350,000 Indians retaining their tribal character.

From the tabular view of the progressive population of the United States, published by William Derby, we find results which have thus far been most singularly verified by the addition of three per cent. per annum from year to year, starting with last census:

The telegraphic statement headed "The Census—Bureau of Statistics," is calculated to mislead the public as to our probable rapid increase in population, notwithstanding the late depopulating war. The conclusion arrived at is that in 1866 the entire population of the States and Territories was 34,565,882, white and black; increase, 3,667,561.

The above calculation, based on a ratio of increase showing the population in 1866 to be 36,069,378, is probably much nearer the truth—giving an increase in six years of 4,643,056 souls.

It must be remembered that not only Europe, but Asia, is now contributing largely to swell our population.
