FOR ADDITIONAL LOCAL ITEMS SEE OUTSIDE FAGES.

A YOUTH FORGES BILLS UPON HIS EMPLOYERS, AND STENDS HIS RECEIPTS IN LOTTERY POLI-CIES.-It has been discovered, after a few days of watching, that a lad named William H. Jones has been receiving money from his employers, Mesers. Drexel & Co., upon forged bills. These bills purported to be for telegraphic messages seni over the wires of the Western Union Telegraph Company. The discovery was made in this way:-A bill for \$38 was presented and paid at the banking-house, and it being known that at the banking-house, and it being known that most of the extensive telegraphing of the firm had been done through the Brokers' Telegraph Company, the Inrepeets of the bill excited sus-picion. An examination disclosed the fact that the bill was a forgery. A conference was then had with a special detective officer; at his sug-gestion it was concluded to await the return of the lad, as it was rightly supposed he would present another bill. Upon his doing so, the money was paid, and he was followed to a lot-tery policy shop in the neighborhood, and was arrested in the act of spending a portion of it for policies, no less than fitteen of the thirty-

for policies, no less than fifteen of the thirtyeight dollars.

reight dollars. The yowthful forger then made a clean breast of it, confessed to the perpetration of numerous forgeries, and said that most of what he had obtained had been expended for policies. From his statement, it appears that he had been employed in the office of the American Telegraph Company until it was con-solidated with the Western Union, when he was sent to the office of the latter. At this time he conceived the idea of presenting a forged bill on the firm of Drexet & Co., and, succeeding in it, he kept on. Young Jones was taken before Alderman Beitler, and, upon evidence of the forgery, was held to bail to answer. On his information proceedings were commenced against the policy dealers, and David Shuman and William A. Miller were arrested at their offices, one being at No. 113 South Third street, the other at No. 56 South Third street. Complaint was made against two others, who were released on a promise to enter had on Monday which we have others, who were released on a promise to enter bail on Monday, which, we learn, was not done. As the prosecution in this case can have no other object than to serve the ends of justice, it is to be hoped that the bills of indictment will be promptly laid before the Grand Jury.



FAREWELL SERMON OF VERY REV. C. J. H. CARTER. - A highly interesting and affecting farewell address was delivered at the Church of the Assumption, on Spring Garden street, below Tweifth, on Sunday morning last, by its Pastor, the Very Rev. C. J. H. Carter, tormerly Vicar-General of the Diocese, in the lifetime of Bishop Neumonn. The reverend gentleman hopes to return to Philadelphia in time for the feast of the Assump-tion, on the 15th of August next-the nineteenth anniversary of the dedication of the church. The members of the congregation have pre-sented their reverend pastor with a handsome offering, in token of the love and esteem they entertain for one who has so long labored with carnesiness and devotion in the cause of reli-gion. It is rumored that a bishop's mitre is in store for Father Carter when he arrives at

Rome. The Rev. Michael Filan, formerly assistant at the Assumption, and lately pastor at St. Gabriel's church, at Hazletov, Pa., will take charge of the parish during the absence of Father Carter.
