ENGLAND'S PAUPERS. THE NUMBER OF ABSOLUTE PAUPERS, LUNATICS, AND VAURANTS IN ENGLAND - INDOOR AND OUTDOOR PAUPERS IN IRBLAND.

The return presented to Parliament, on the motion of Viscount Enfield, M. P., discloses a lamentable increase this year in pauperism, as compared with 1866. On the last day of the first week in February last there were in England and Wales \$98,401 paupers in receipt of relief, being an increase of 97,012 over the corresponding week of the preceding year, of whom 50,650 were in the metropolis; in the second week of February, 982,273, or an increase of 80,117, of whom 41,364 were in the metropolis; third week, 9671,425, or an increase of 68,031—36,459 being in the metropolis; fourth week, 965,404, or an increase of 60,611, of whom 33,845 were in the metropolis. In the last week the number was composed of 518,619 outdoor and 146,485 indoor poor.

The above figures are exclusive of lunatic paupers in asylums and vagrants.

There are, at present, 14,886 parishes, inclusive of the Scilly Islands, in England and Wales, maintaining, or liable to maintain, their own poor; but the shave returns refer only to 14,695 of that number; 191 parishes, incorporated under Gilbert's act, still under the provisions.

of the 43d Elizabeth, making no return of the humber of paupers which they relieve.
From the return called for by Sir H. Barron, it appears that the gross amount expended for the relief of the poor in Ireland, in the year ending 29th September, 1806, was £728 207, as compared with £61, 80f in the preceding year. There were in receipt of relief on the last Saturday in January. 1867, 77, 422 paupers; in 1806, 68,708; in 1865, 74, 287. The 77, 422 for this year include J1,207 adult able-bodied paupers, and 903 widows in receipt of out-door relief.
In 1868 the amount of poor rate lodged was £749,767, all other receipts amounting to £8007.
