THE MORTUARY REPORT OF THE CITY .- Philadelphia continues to be one of the most healthy cities in the United States, as the following state-ment showing the number of deaths during the present year, as compared with the same period in 1866 will show a decrease of 118; the number of deaths for the months of January, February, March, April, and May each year being 1866, 5978: 1867, 5860.

The number of male deaths during the present year amounted to 3054, and the number of females to 2806, an excess of males over females of 248. Of the 5860 deaths during 1867, there were 2852 children, of whom 1532 were boys and 1320 girls. The deaths from consumption of lungs amounted to 961, an increase of 64 over the number for the corresponding month of 1866.


