PARIS, May 22.—"There was a sound of revelry by hight" in the halls of the British Embassy from last eve's smiset to this morning's surrise. The greatest fete of the season was given there to the Prince of Wales. Something was said in the French papers about Lady Cowley's visiting list having been severely expurgated for the occasion. Far from this being the case, everybedy was at the embassy who habitually goes there, and many who were never there before. Although a temporary room, nearly as large as all the rest of the saloons put together, had been built expressly for this bail, the crowd was greater than anybody of this generation remembers in the same place. The improvised saloon of which I speak comprised the large square space in the garden between the wings of the embassy palace in which are the new ball-room and the supper-room. This saloon was covered throughout with a rich Aubusson carpet; there was a fountain in the centre; seats were tastefully arranged among flower-beds and arbors, and the light was brilliant and most artistically managed. At the far end next the carden was the buffet, and behind this the high CROWNED HEADS IN ABUNDANCE, artistically managed. At the far end next the garden was the buffet, and behind this the high wall was covered from the ground to the root with fresh flowers. Amidst these flowers, high up above the right and left of the buffet, apwail was covered from the ground to the roof with fresh flowers, Amidst these flowers, high up above the right and left of the buffet, appeared handsome gransparancies representing the Prince of Wales' feathers, with the motto "Ich Dien." As to the company present, you will find long lists in the obronicies habitually devoted to such subjects. I shall only say that all the eighty personages whose names you will read in yesterday's Mondeur as having dined at the Thileries on Thursday were there; and, in addition, all the official and diplomatic personages usually seen at fashionable fetes, and a very large proportion of those English residents and visitors to whom, for one reason or another, the embassy extends its hospitality. The number of caids of invitation issued is said to have been 2500. The ball was opened by a quadrille (the quadrille d'honneur), in which the Frince of Wales danced with the Empress of the French, having vis-avis the Duke of Edinburgh and the Queen of the Beigians. The side couples were Prince Joachim Murat and the Princess Eugenie of Leuchtenberg, and Lord Royston and the Duchess of Manchester. You will read in La France that the Emperor opened the ball with the Queen of the Beigians, having the King of the Belgians and the Empress for their vis-a vis. But this is a mistake, neither the Emperor nor the King of the Belgians danced during the whole evening. Prince Napoleon came late, and stayed but a very short time. He did not join the Imperial and royal party at the supper-table. Both the Queen of Portugal and the Princess Clotildo sent excuses. The cause of their absence was a yery homely and simple one. The Princess Clotildo sent excuses. The cause of their absence her ompany, passing a quiet evening, and talking about their bables, to going out. At this ball there was a great sprink ling of knee-breeches and tights. They were far from being in a majority, but formed a very respectable minority. Some wore at the knees bows of black ribbons. Lord Royston had on a blue coat, with velvet quarter of a century ago. His lordship, who is on intimate terms with the Prince of Wales, may perhaps bring this coat into fashion again -but last night he was alone in his glory. Prince of Wales wore a black coat and white waistcoat, across which was the broad red grand cerdon of the Legion of Honor, tights, and the garter on the knee. The Duke of Edinburgh was dressed in precisely the same Edinburgh was dressed in precisely the same way, with the exception that he wore the blue ribbon of the garter across his white waistcoat. They both had a rosebud in a buttonnole, the freshness of which throughout the evening, I understand, attributable to a new and ingenious tailor's contrivance, by means of which the rose stalk is placed in a little phial of water, hidden in a pocket made expressly for it. Both the Princes looked extremely well, entered into the amusements of the evening with all the spirit of their age, and made them selves most agreeable to all who had the privilege of speaking with them. I need not enter into many details as to the order in which the Imperial and Royal personages sat at supper, which lasted a long while; white beards wagged Imperial and Royal personages sat at supper, which lasted a long while; white beards wagged merily, and most of the dishes handed round were not tasted merely, but done justice to in a serious and business-like way. The Empress held a particularly animated conversation with the Prince of Wales, who seemed to amuse her greatly. When the Highland piper went round the table with the bagpipes, the Prince directed her Majesty's attention to some ladies who were stopping their ears, and laughed goodhumorediy at their want of appreciation of Highland music. I was greatly struck by the Highland music. I was greatly struck by the great resemblance of the King of the Belgians to the portraits of Francis I. I see that La Liberte of this evening makes the same remark. While the Imperial and Royal party was at while the Imperial and Royal party was at table, the general company took their places at other tables in the same room. Ultimately there was a sit down supper for everybody, with plenty of attendance, and all the evening long there was abundance of supplemental refreshment at the buffet. At about 2 o'clock the cotillion began. It was conducted by the Marquis de Caux. The Prince of Wales chose for his partner for this dance, which lasted fully two hours, the beautiful Marquise de Gallifet. In the broad daylight of five o'clock dancing In the broad daylight of five o'clock dancing was still going on. The Prince of Wales and the Duke of Edinburgh leave Paris for London to-morrow. Prince Oscar of Sweden also leaves to morrow.
